The college is the beacon of hope for the marginalized and under-privileged people of the district. Having completed 34 years of valuable educational service, the college now offers degree programmes in Commerce, Mass Communication, History, Development Economics, Computer Science and a PG programme in Commerce. The majority of the students of this college come from very poor families of plantation laborers and tribal communities. The prospects of their higher education revolve around this institution, which is one of the trailblazers in the Higher education sector of Wayanad. The College aims to mould the student community hailing mostly from the marginalized and weaker sections of the society into better individuals, and guide them to contribute constructively towards national goals by upholding the values of secularism, national integration and social commitment. The primary objective of the institution is to enable the students to cope with the demands of the contemporary global scenario through effective transaction of the curricular and co-curricular aspects. Academic excellence, personality development and social orientation are our guiding principles.

We strive to combine the basic ethical principles with academic excellence and technological skills so as to enable the students to become enlightened in their social and professional life. CURRICULUM PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTATION

INTRODUCTION

After the introduction of CBCSS, the curriculum has become more student centric and inclusive. We have been fortunate to get a new UG Programme in computer science. Open courses have introduced an interdisciplinary nature in the learning process. The college has been taking maximum care to provide all the possible benefits of the new system to the students and teachers. All the developmental strategies planned and implemented by the college have been with such a perspective that every attempt is made to make the academic environment democratic.

1.1.1 *State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.*

VISION:

“KINDLING THE MINDS”

The college strives to shape the student community, which is the cream of the society into better citizens, and guides them to contribute constructively towards national priorities like creation of wealth and generation of employment.

We have a vision that the students coming out of our campus should be spiritually enlightened, psychologically sound and practically efficient. We should get our country, leaders who are intellectually competent, spiritually mature, morally upright, psychologically integrated, physically healthy and acceptable in the society, who will champion the cause of justice, truth and peace and who are open to further growth. We should aspire towards creating a just human society where human person is respected, where our cultural heritage of Ahimsa, Religious Plurality and National Integration are upheld and where the poor and marginalized are specially taken care of.

MISSION:

- To impart high end quality education through innovative techniques and practices.
- To equip the socially and economically backward students to cope with the latest requirements through modern technologies.
- To provide basic facilities to the students from various parts of the state.
- To familiarize with new arenas of knowledge and to engage more deeply in studies and researches.
- To ensure the physical, mental and social development of the students through curricular and co- curricular activities and their contributions to the society and to the country at large.
- To mould talented intellectual youth and dedicate them for up-gradation of the society

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective Implementation of the Curriculum? Give details of the process and Substantiate through specific example(s).

Every year in the month of June, the Principal convenes a staff meeting and drafts a comprehensive action plan for the effective implementation of the curriculum. Duties are assigned to various members of the faculty after the preparation of an academic calendar for the current year. Regular meetings of various committees entrusted with different duties are held and programmes are evaluated.

- The institution directs all the departments and staff members to prepare a teaching plan and time table for each course and to follow the workload strictly.
- The maintenance and monitoring of the teachers diary by the Principal and Heads of the Departments is a regular practice.
- The library and computer lab with internet facilities adequately support the students to widen the horizon of their knowledge.
- Each faculty member is entrusted to prepare study materials for distribution among the students for their academic preparation.
- Projects, assignments and seminars are given to the students to improve their academic quality through continuous evaluation.
- Feedback received from the students is conveyed to the faculty members and suggestions are given to make their teaching more effective.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the university and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

From the University:

- The University conducts Orientation and Refresher programs with the support of UGC through the Academic Staff College.
- Workshops and short term courses are arranged in various disciplines.
- Orders and consecutive curriculum changes are promptly communicated to the affiliated colleges.
- The curriculum is periodically reviewed as per the guidance of respective Board of Studies.

From the college:

- Each faculty member is persuaded to attend one orientation program and one refresher course within the first six years of his/her service.
- The institution encourages faculty to attend seminars, workshops and refresher courses organized by various departments and agencies.
- The college regularly organizes workshops, seminars and lecture series for the updation of knowledge among the faculty and students.

From the Government:

- As part of a global academic vision, the Government encourages teachers and students through different means. The teachers are empowered through new academic initiatives such as FLAIR, with National and International opportunities for interaction and better academic quality. The students are given a new direction and orientation in their learning through new initiatives such as ASAP, WWS and SSP. Higher Education Council publishes an international Journal for teachers.

From the Service Organizations:

The service organizations are doing the following things with a view to improve the quality of the teachers:

- Seminars and workshops in different disciplines and areas.
- Evaluation of the existing curriculum.
- Special academic seminar during their annual conferences.
- Surveys and researches on new initiatives.
- Research journals and publications of teachers' articles.
- An academic committee functions to concentrate on the curricular transactions of the teachers.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

- ICT Training programs were organized for the faculty members by IQAC.
 - Teachers are directed to participate in Orientation programs and Refresher courses. From our college 21 teachers participated in such programs during the past years.
- SSR- NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta

- The institution directs all the departments and staff members to prepare teaching plans for each course and to follow them strictly.
- Teachers are encouraged to participate and present papers in national and international seminars/ workshops/ conferences.
- Teachers' Diary is maintained and is regularly monitored by the Heads of the Departments and the Principal monitors the same weekly.
- University norms regarding continuous evaluation of students are strictly adhered to and the co-ordinator of CBCSS monitors the internal grades. The complaints and grievances are rectified quickly.
- High speed broadband Wi-Fi Internet connectivity is available throughout the campus.
- Students' feedback on courses and programs are collected at the end of each semester and is communicated to the teaching faculty for improvement.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as Industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum?

- As a curricular requirement, students are given the opportunity to visit industrial centers and various libraries to get a better exposure and reinforcement.
- The PG Dept. of Commerce organizes student visits to various industrial production units in the state every academic year viz, KINFRA, various University Centers, Institute of Management Kozhikode and SEBI. Student interactions with successful entrepreneurs and professionals in the field of banking, accounting and management on and off the campus are regularly organized. The students are given training to perform in group discussions and interviews. Management fest conducted by the department has been an event that exhibited the organising capabilities of the students. The major areas in the fest were 'Pecunia', a finance game, Tycoon, best manager game, 'Creativo', ad-film making competition and Quash, business quiz competition.
- The Dept. of Economics organizes students trips to places of ecological importance and to centers of economic and financial importance as a part of their syllabus.
- The Dept.of History yearly organizes study tours to places of historical and archaeological importance such as Hampi, Chitradurga and museums. It also conducts field visits to locally important historical sites and archives
- The Dept.of Computer Science has devised a software- hardware service startup named 'Sparrows Tech' incubated at startup village, Cochin by the second semester students of the department for experiencing industrial linkage of the thrust areas. The department has research and development tie-up with the Department of Computer Science, University of Calicut in Pattern Recognition, GIS and remote sensing. The department also conducts industrial visit to Infosys, Mysore and WIPRO, Bangalore

- The Dept. of Mass Communication conducts media visit to organisations like AIR, Media One, and Kairali TV etc. Our students assisted Kerala Cricket council to publish a supplement in connection with the recent India- South Africa cricket match series, at Krishnagiri. Interactions with experts from reputed media organisations like PTI, Times of India are regularly conducted.
- Under ‘Walk With a Scholar’ program, visit to IIM, NIT and industrial centers are also conducted.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University? (Number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, students’ feedback, teachers’ feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions, etc.).

The following faculty members represent our college in the various Boards of Studies, and Academic Council, of the University: Mr. Leril James, Assistant Professor of Dept of Commerce has been the subject expert in the Inspection Commission for sanctioning new colleges in Mahatma Gandhi University. Mr. Arun K, Assistant Professor, Department of Commerce is a member of Board of Studies in Management Studies. Dr. Basheer Poolakkal is a member of U.G. Board of Studies, Arabic in Kannur University and member of P.G. Board of Studies in Arabic in Mahatma Gandhi University.

Following are the major suggestions received from the students, teachers and the parents:

- Ensure maximum number of working days and teaching hours.
- Ensure timely conduct of university examinations at the end of each semester and publication of the results on time.
- Ensure the availability of textbooks and additional reference materials prescribed in syllabus of different courses.
- Revise the syllabus as per the contemporary and technical requirements.

1.1.7 Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating University) by it? If ‘yes’, give details on the process (‘Needs Assignment’, design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed.

Our college offered an ‘add-on course’ for UG students .The staff council decided the nature and design of the course and advised the concerned department. The details and syllabus of the course were forwarded to the University for further

approval. The Department of Commerce offered an ‘add-on course’ on ‘Tally’ during the year 2013-14.

1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

Regular internal tests and centralized model examinations are periodically conducted. The IQAC and staff council systematically analyse the results. Weaker students are given further options to improve their grade in the examinations. If needed, special training sessions are given to them. At the end of each semester, the students are asked to evaluate the curriculum. Class PTA and General PTA are convened regularly to evaluate students progress.

1.2 ACADEMIC FLEXIBILITY

Course Objectives/ Goal

The Department of Commerce has conducted an ‘add-on’ course on TFAP (Tally Financial Accounting Program) through which institution scored 50 participants from the students. The course was a combine venture with Tally Academy, Kalpetta

- To familiarize the students with computerized accounting environment and latest developments in the field.
- To impart accounting skills to the students, as to enhance employability.

1.3 CURRICULUM ENRICHMENT

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's curriculum to ensure that the academic program's and institutions' goals and objectives are integrated.

The aim of the college to enhance the students with latest professional and technical advantages is complimentary with university curriculum focusing on employability, social consciousness and additional skills. Several innovative bodies such as Literary Forum, Entrepreneurial Development club, English club, Tourism club, Film club, Music club, General Knowledge Club, Folklore club and Debate club are functioning in the college in order to improve the academic and extracurricular potential of the students. A green army is constituted in the college in association with Social Forestry Department. Their activities include creation of awareness on environment, organic farming, a star forest program, and beautification of the campus through natural means. The compulsory social service as prescribed by the University is mandatory for all the UG students in the college.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to the needs of the dynamic employment market?

All the departments conducted 5/4 course lecture series to give greater awareness for the students in the concerned disciplines. Luminaries from various fields were brought to the campus as a part of this program. The career guidance cell in the college addresses the needs of the students in the areas of communication, personality development, body language, so as to make them better candidates in the employment market. With this view special classes and training programs are offered in the areas of logical reasoning, numerical ability, analytical skills, group discussions and interviews. A huge collection of books purchased under the head of Entry in Service coaching are frequently distributed to the students. With this view several journals for competitive examinations are subscribed by the general library and department library. IQAC conducted two workshops on ICT to strengthen the technical skills of the teachers.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate change, Environmental education, Human rights, ICT, etc., into the curriculum?

The current curriculum of the University gives special attention to sensitize the students in the burning issues of the day such as gender, environment, marginalization, globalization, multilingualism and plurality. The star forest program and organic SSR- NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta

farming under the Green Army of the college is very significant in this respect. The NSS units of the college adopted a tribal colony near the college. The students were instrumental in giving certain basic facilities in the colony such as electricity, TV, Umbrellas and furniture to the tribal school. This have in turn created a sense of social responsibility among the students. The women cell conducted several discussions and motivating sessions related to the contemporary life of women.

We have 25 acres of land and 8 acres is kept as marsh land to conserve the biodiversity. The campus comprises a wide variety of birds, several trees and much local variety of butterflies, and certain rare representatives from the flora and fauna such as monkeys, peacocks, wild pig, hares and bear.

Adequate representation is given for both boys and girls while constituting various committees and clubs such as nature club, green army, NSS and Red Ribbon Club etc. The Red Ribbon Club of the college bagged the award for best Red Ribbon Club in the state in 2014-15.

When human right violations occur, the students are sensitized about them through rallies, demonstrations, meetings, posters, talks, films and so on. 40th anniversary of Emergency was discussed in the campus under the leadership of the Department of History. The Department of Humanities of the college conducts classes on issues related to gender, human rights and so on.

All the classrooms in the college are equipped with interactive whiteboards. The college has a well furnished digital theatre with advanced technical facilities. The Institution also offers a broadband Wi-Fi internet connectivity with unlimited access to students. IQAC conducted two workshops on ICT to enable teachers in the management of computer hardware/software.

Publications like research Journal '*Explorations*' and newsletter '*Little Narratives*' is a remarkable achievement.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programs offered to ensure holistic development of students?

The moral and ethical values are heightened through the following means:

- Adoption of a tribal colony at Padapuram near the college.
- Serving the sick through pain and palliative care.
- Red ribbon club of NSS
- Distribution of beds for neighbouring tribal colony.
- Active participation of students in the program conducted for the welfare of the differently abled.
- An anti-drug campaign under NSS.
- Financial assistance to poor patients through collections initiated by the students.
- Distribution of festival kits to the bedridden patients by the students.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples, enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

At the end of each semester feedback is received from the students regarding teaching and curriculum. The suggestions on the basis of student evaluation are forwarded to the respective board of studies. In 2013, certain changes were made in the syllabus of BA Development Economics as per our suggestions. Similarly, the paper Basics of Computer Applications in BA Mass communication was replaced by History of Mass Media as a result of the suggestions forwarded by the teachers and the students. The recommendations of the parents and alumni are also considered after their periodic meetings.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programs?

A large variety of enrichment programs are conducted by various departments and extracurricular bodies in the institution. They include seminars, workshops, lecture series, debates, quizzes and panel discussions. After this systematic evaluation those with better rating are promoted and those with poor rating are discontinued. The literary forum of the college has been publishing a collection of magazine consists a large variety of creative and critical write ups from the students and faculty. The students have been regularly publishing wall magazine in a variety of designs. The Department of Commerce has been conducting Management Fests to promote the managerial and critical faculty of the students. The Department of Mass Communication released several news papers and documentaries to improve the skills of the students in digital, visual, and print media. A collection of photographs and short film making workshops were conducted with the same motive. The debate club has been conducting discussions, extempore and elocution in relevant topics. The folklore club has been encouraging the students to analyse the artistic and cultural values, tribal arts of Wayanad, The literary creation of the students have been published in reputed Malayalam magazine such as *Mathrubhoomi*, *Madhyamam* and *Deshabhimani*.

1.4 FEEDBACK SYSTEM

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

- Our faculty members who are in the Board of Studies take part in the planning of Curriculum Design and give their suggestions to improve the curriculum. Dr. Basheer Poolakkal, faculty of Arabic Department is a member of UG Board of Studies in Arabic of MG University and a member of PG Board of Studies in Arabic of Kannur

University. Prof. Arun K, faculty from the Dept of Commerce is a member of Board of studies in Management Studies

- Teena George ,faculty from the Dept. of Economics prepared the syllabus for Agricultural Economics ,Complementary paper for UG students in 2014.
- College deputed faculty members to attend the curriculum workshops for teachers.
- A number of teachers have set question papers in different subjects for Universities across Kerala.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on curriculum? If yes, how is it communicated to the University and made use of internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programs?

The institution has a regular mechanism of collecting feedback from students. At the end of each semester, responses of the students are collected orally and in writing as per the format designed by the college. The responses of the alumni and parents are also collected in their regularly convened meetings. The concerned department subjects the sum total of such responses to systematic analysis and observations are communicated to higher authorities. In the courses such as Economics and Mass Communication, certain curricular transformations have been implemented as per our recommendations.

1.4.3 How many new programs/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programs?

Being a Government college, new courses can only be obtained through proper channels subjected to the fiscal policies of the Government. The college has been demanding UG programs in computer science, Physics, English, Political Science have only been fortunate to get an undergraduate program in Computer Science during the year 2012-2013. The social backwardness of Wayanad District, increased number of tribal students and the need of improved accessibility, skills to overcome technical and professional backwardness vindicate the choice of Computer Science as an undergraduate program in the college. The college has been focusing such courses as B.Sc. Physics, BA Political Science MCJ and MA History whereby the tribal students in the college will get better opportunity and socio cultural orientation. The Government has virtually promised to sanction a UG Program and PG program in the coming academic Year.

CRITERION II

TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

INTRODUCTION

The institution has been focusing the smooth and democratic deliverance of the academic process in an inclusive framework. Advanced facilities such as INFLIBNET, DELNET, high speed broadband connectivity, language lab and so on are developed with this view. All the class rooms are equipped with interactive whiteboards. The facilities in laboratory are also considerably extended. Creative learning technique such as Campus Radio and Box of Success are also introduced to boost the learning process. Special focus is also given for carrier orientation through the initiative such as Entry in Service Coaching Programme, Prof. Mathew Puliymmakkal endowment lecture, campus interview and so on. The performers in academic and extracurricular activities have always been duly appreciated by PTA and other statutory bodies in the college.

2.1 STUDENT ENROLMENT AND PROFILE

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The university notification in the newspaper and website is the initial step of the admission process. The college being affiliated to University of Calicut has no option for separate notification. The rank list prepared as per the guidance, rules and regulation provided by the Government of Kerala is published in the college notice board during the stipulated dates. A hardcopy of the same is sent to the registrar of the university. Details regarding the vacant seats are informed to the public through newspaper advertisements and websites. The single window system introduced by the University of Calicut from 2013-14 Academic year onwards provides transparency and greater opportunities for students.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission to various programs of the institution

The admission is fully done as per the rules and guidance provided by the university and government of Kerala. The criterion for admission, the date of collection and distribution of application form, rank list publication including waiting list and sure list, notification of admission and the final date of its completion are all decided by the university. The staff council constitutes an admission committee each year to govern the admission process. The rank list as mentioned above is published by the committee within the stipulated time. 50% of the seats are reserved for different categories eligible for the same. The table of reservation is as follows.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

University of Calicut being the final authority in the decision of admission procedure, the college has no say in the admission procedures except the admission committee which is periodically constituted by the staff council. However the committee ensures that the vacant seats are filled with in the time span given by university. If a student leaves after the date on which the university closes the admission procedure, the college has no provision to fill such vacancies. Each department prepares a student profile on the basis of the available data. The present system of admission with its efficiency and transparency ensures diversity of the students in the class room.

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate /reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion.

The university has certified certain admission norms so as to ensure the representation of diverse category of students. Being a government college, we also

strictly adhere to those rules provided by the Government of Kerala in this respect. Wayanad being a backward district of Kerala, we strive for maximum opportunity for the weaker sections in the society while ensuring transparency and complete fairness in the admission. This is fully in adherence with the spirit of social justice and protective discrimination preached by our constitution.

SC/ST

SC/ST students are given 20% of reservation in the admission. Being a tribal belt, 15% reservation is provided for ST students, thus ensuring the participation of different categories of tribal students in Wayanad such as Paniya, Adiya, Kurichiya, Kuruma, Kattunaikas and so on. Students from these communities are also eligible for fee concession and scholarship benefits as per the rules of government, UGC, and the University.

OBC

18% of seats are reserved for OBC as per the reservation policy of the University and the Government. They include Hindu Ezhava 8%, Muslim 7% and Hindu OBC 3%. As Wayanad is one of the earliest settlements of migrants from Travancore, this reservation has special significance in the admission process. Those students are also benefited with fee concession and scholarships as per the rules mentioned above.

Women

Almost 70% of the students in the campus consists of women though there is no special reservation allotted to them. This high increase in the enrollment ratio of female students indicates the changing attitude of conventional social groups and orthodox religious groups towards education. A lion share of the girls in the campus come from minority communities, SC and ST. The fee concession and scholarship benefits have definitely boosted the economic security of their family thus encouraging them to send more of their children for education. The special scholarships given for minorities by non governmental agencies have also made significant changes in this respect.

Differently Abled

A single seat is reserved for differently abled in each course. A special forum designed for the welfare of the differently abled and the presence of four differently abled staff members definitely give them confidence.

Financially weaker sections

10% seats are reserved for financially weaker students from the general community. As Wayanad consists of large number of tea and coffee plantations, students from the homes of these workers are greatly benefited by this reservation. They are also eligible for fee concession and scholarships subject to Government norms.

Minorities

7% seats are reserved for Muslims. 2% seats are reserved for LC/SIUC and OBC Christians.

Sports Quota

Two seats are reserved for students with commendable achievements in sports. The admission process is governed by the district sports council. Students are purely selected on the basis of their performance.

Lakshadweep

One seat is reserved for students from Lakshadweep

2.1.6 Provide the following details for various programs offered by the institution during the last four years and commend on the trends. i.e., reasons for increases/decrease and actions initiated for improvement.

Due to paucity of institutions and presence of large number of qualified students, the demand for UG and PG Courses has been increasing year by year. As ours is the only college under the University of Calicut offering a UG Program in Development Economics, there has been a steady increase in the number of applicants due to the greater employability offered by this course. Likewise, Ours is the only Government College offering a degree course in Mass Communication and Journalism. The Department is furnished with all the latest digital and audio equipments for giving sufficient training to the students in the respective areas. Naturally, students from different parts of Kerala are running after this course. As the Commerce Department has produced a number of NET achievers, the course has also been of great demand. Due to the backward nature of the district some courses such as Degree in Political Science, Degree in Malayalam, Degree in English, PG in Economics, History and Mass Communication are in high demand. The college gives proposals annually to the concerned authorities for sanctioning such courses. Unfortunately we didn't get any positive results so far.

2.2 CATERING TO STUDENTS DIVERSITY

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently abled students and to ensure adherence to Government policies in this regard?

The college follows strictly the rules of the government with regard to the admission of differently abled students. One seat is reserved in each program for the people with more than 40% disability. Two ramps are constructed in the college for the smooth passage of differently abled students. Special attention is given in the class

room considering the manner of their impairment. In addition to that there are three visually challenged faculties in the college and a non teaching staff who is orthopedically disabled. The faculties are given special facilities including computer with screen reader. They are also exempted from certain tasks which are difficult for them. There are eleven differently abled students suffering from multiple kinds of disability. Maximum effort is taken to ensure their participation in the main stream. A special forum is designed for giving maximum assistance to them and for boosting their confidence in all avenues of social life. Two teachers are supervising the functioning of this forum. Sufficient assistance is given to them such as scribes, magnified textbooks, A/V aids, specially designed writing pads, audio books and so on. Above all the audio books are recorded by the college NSS unit for the benefit of visually challenged students across the state.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the program? If 'yes', give details on the process.

The counselling conducted for students and parents on the admission day helps the teacher to form a reasonable idea about the background and the needs of the students. Profiles of every student are collected including all the basic information needed for boosting their academic and extra-curricular accomplishments. Further the introduction program conducted respectively for the students and parents during their admission becomes guiding point in this respect. On the basis of preliminary tests conducted in the initial part of the courses, students are categorized as slow learners, average and advanced learners. Sufficient training is given as per the nature of their predicament through programs such as Walk With a Scholar, Scholar Support Program and remedial coaching.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the program of their choice? (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses etc).

Scholar Support Program: Scholar Support Program initiated by the Kerala government aims at empowering the slow learners. This provides additional class hour in each subject so as to improve the quality of slow learners in concerned disciplines.

Remedial Coaching: Remedial teaching funded by UGC also aims at slow learners. Additional hours are arranged either as post class hour session or on holidays. The attendance of the students, examination records and progress reports are strictly maintained.

Tutorial system: The tutorial system running in the college aims at the strengthening of the weaker students. Each student is assigned to a particular teacher. The concerned tutor tries to identify the physical, social, cultural, economic and familial reasons behind the slow progress of the student. Adequate measures are taken to overcome the barriers through systematic interventions. If needed, the student is also sent for counseling. The PTA's schemes for financial assistance also make significant contributions in this respect.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college always tries to make the students aware of all forms of discriminations in the society and also strengthens them to fight such discriminations.

Women cell: This being a college with more than 70% female students the college has been making special emphasis on the progress of female student in the campus. The women cell in the college has been organizing awareness classes, debates and discussions on the various issues directly and indirectly affecting the lives of women in the society. A special judo coaching program has also been organized under the cell to impart physical mobility and emotional strength to the female students. Through different measures, the students have been made confident to resist different threats against them. The needy students have also been given counseling by the women faculty in the cell.

Anti-Harassment Committee: A committee is constituted to prevent harassment of female employees and students at work place.

Nature club: Wayanad being a district that is highly valued and appreciated for its environmental purity and rareness, special emphasis has been made to create awareness among students about the protection of environment, maintaining of natural equilibrium and having an eco-friendly approach to life. A nature club has been actively working with this effect. Every world environment day, each student has been asked to plant a tree and to nurture it further. ‘The green army’ formed in the campus have been doing commendable services with the aim of creating a clean and eco friendly campus. The star forest project with the assistance of Department of Social Forestry, Kerala has been maintaining the trees related to all these stars in the zodiac as per the astrological codes. The students have been sending to different locations such as Pakshipathalam, Muthanga wild life sanctuary for two day nature camps. This has further raised their environmental consciousness. In connection with Gandhi Jayanthi the college NSS unit conducts clean campus program for a week. NCC organizes trekking to Chembra peak, the second highest peak in Kerala. The campus is fully plastic free. Besides that bird baths are kept at different spots in the campus.

National service scheme: NSS aims at creating a service mentality among the students and imparting a collective consciousness in them. The detailed report of the activities of NSS is given in the particular section.

2.2.5 How does the institution identity and respond to special educational /learning needs of advanced learners?

The Campus provides all the advanced facilities such as INFLIBNET, a high speed broadband Wi-Fi connectivity and well furnished general library with various SSR- NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta

digital and print journals including DELNET. Thus the advanced learners are given multiple resources and several motivating lectures to channelize their skills. Advanced students are motivated for internal and external seminar presentations. They are also sufficiently guided to choose appropriate options for highest studies by the career guidance and counseling cell. The recently installed EDUSAT facility and digital theatre with advanced technology are other significant aspects. Contemporary issues are thoroughly discussed through debates in the classes.

Creative students are encouraged to participate in literary workshops held in different parts of the state. As a result, their creations are continuously published in a number of reputed magazines. The college literary club is about to publish a book compiling such scripts. The new initiatives under Government of Kerala, WWS also promotes the advanced learners.

Walk With a Scholar: Walk With a Scholar, a new initiative of government of Kerala aims at improving the quality and consciousness about the appropriate area of higher studies for advanced learners. Five students are selected for an internal mentor in the first year degree on purely merit basis. They are given internal and external mentoring to highlight their academic potential. Special emphasis is given on identifying adequate profession for their life. Field trips are also organized to various locations associated with their subject so as to widen the horizon of their learning.

Special coaching is also given on such significant areas like communication skills, numerical ability, logical and analytical reasoning and so on.

Awards and scholarships: The college gives importance to appreciate talented students and to alleviate, the financial burden of students, by giving scholarships . Every year an endowment is given in the name of Pro. Mathew Puliymmakkal, previous faculty in the college for the toppers in University English examinations. The college PTA every year congratulates students who are talented in multiple areas such as academics, arts, sports and so on. The scholarship cell in the campus gives special attention to the registration of maximum students to all the available private and public scholarships. A student in the college is also bestowed with scholarship of British Malayali Association (Educate a kid).

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use data and information on the academic performance (through the program duration) of students at risk of drop

out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)

The academic rewards, personal profiles, attendance and progress reports are systematically maintained by the class tutors. Students are continuously and systematically evaluated.

In the regularly convened PTA Meetings, special discussion is carried out with the parents of those students with high risk of dropping out. Thus maximum effort is taken to ensure their continuous presence in the class. In addition to the governmental scholarships, PTA also assists financially weaker students. There is Poor Students Aid Fund in the college, which is given to economically weaker students.

2.3 TEACHING- LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)?

The academic activities of the college are done as per the academic calendar of the University of Calicut. The Departments give assignments, viva, seminars and projects to the students as part of the curriculum. Field trips and industrial visits are arranged as per the same. The lab experiments are systematically planned and monitored by the concerned departments. Students are continuously evaluated through their performance in the class rooms and examinations. The Internal marks are published at the end of each semester and complaints if any, are solved through internal grievance redressal mechanism in the campus. The model examinations increase the confidence of the students to face the final examinations. The final results are published by the University.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process? Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the college aims at planning, guiding and monitoring quality assurance and quality enhancement activities of the institution.

The IQAC in the campus has been systematically planning and conducting programs for the welfare of the faculty and students in the campus. The IQAC collects feedback from students at the end of each semester regarding teaching and curriculum, subjected to the guidelines prescribed by the UGC. The forms are systematically

evaluated, graded and handed over to the concerned authorities for improvement. The IQAC also conducted two workshops on ICT enabled teaching to improve the technical skills of the teachers. The IQAC has been advising the departments to strictly record and monitor attendance, marks, and other performance indicators of the students. It has also been assisting the discipline committee to maintain moral and academic discipline in the campus. IQAC has been guiding concerned faculty to prepare the academic calendar. It has also been giving constructive suggestions for the utilization of funds under various heads. Thus IQAC has been striving in all possible ways to raise the institution as a centre for excellence.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The CCSS/ CBCCSS introduced by the University of Calicut in the year 2011 and 2014 respectively are paradigm shift in the higher education and learning is made more student centric in this approach. The facilities such as INFLIBNET, Broadband facility with Wi-Fi connectivity, DELNET and a highly resourceful general library have been increasing the academic curiosity and the spirit of enquiry among students. They have been equipped to present papers with the assistance of interactive whiteboards. Students have been given greater autonomy in the choice of topics for assignments and seminars. The students have also been given maximum freedom to choose their own open course within the available limits.

CCSS: The Choice Based Credit and Semester System (CCSS) introduced by the University for both undergraduate and postgraduate programs made the programs more student-centric. Group Activities: Discussions, project works, seminars, socio-economic surveys, quiz programs, study tour, camps etc are designed to get the maximum participation of the students.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

Various academic and co-curricular bodies in the campus have been striving to promote critical and creative inquiries among the students. The academic workshops and seminars have been moulded with a view to promote the questioning ability of the students. The debate club has been discussing the contemporary issues to reveal contrasting perspectives. Due to the participation of a number of students in the creative and critical workshops throughout the state, their write-ups have been

published in a host of popular magazines. The students of mass Communication have produced several documentaries, video production, and photo features, bringing the socio cultural situations under trial. Some of them have won awards and critical acclaim. 'The Campus Radio', daily broadcasting in the campus by the department of Mass Communication is a popular and new experiment. The college magazine for 2012-2013 'Mangandikku Kootu Pokumo' has been selected as the best college magazine of the year by *Malayala Manorama*. The literary forum in the campus has organised a collection of book reviews and interactions with eminent writers to promote critical thinking. Such Well-known scholars in Kerala as Dr. K.N Ganesh, Prof. K.E.N Kunjahammad, Dr. M.N. Karassery, E.P.Rajagopalan (critic), Prof. Kalpetta Narayanan, Dr.T.P.Kunjikkanan, Hameed Chennamangaloor (social Activist), Prof. Veeran kutty, (poet), Suveeran (Film Director), M.A. Rahman, Ashraf IRS, an alumni of the college and several other prominent figures have visited the college during the last five years. The interactions with them also considerably enhanced the critical and creative perspective of students. The Management fests conducted by the department of commerce have also succeeded in raising the managerial and administrative skill of the students.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty members for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning- resources from National Program on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The following facilities are available in the college for effective teaching:

Digital theatre: A well equipped digital theatre is functioning in the college, which helps the students to become audience of movies, performances and documentaries of various cultural, social and artistic events.

EDUSAT: The EDUSAT studio is available for online interactive classes and video conferencing.

The library: The library is equipped with INFLIBNET, e-journals, DELNET etc.

Wi-Fi Internet facility is available with free access to the staff and students. The faculty members use the Scholar Portal of Directorate of Collegiate Education .All the class rooms are equipped with interactive white boards which facilitate ICT oriented teaching process.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty members exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

The IQAC and Departments in the college ensure high standard of learning among the students through the installation of advanced technologies and the conducting effective programs. The technical facilities include broadband high speed internet connectivity, INFLIBNET, DELNET, Campus radio and so on. All the major departments have conducted seminars, workshops and lecture series while bringing the experts in the concerned disciplines to the campus. The members of the faculty and students have also participated in several National and International Seminar.

Remedial teaching

The remedial coaching sponsored by UGC aims at strengthening the academic potentials of weaker sections of the students while giving special emphasis on their technical, communicative and main disciplines during extra hours. The tougher portions are revised and taught in a simplified manner .

Entry in services

Entry in service program sponsored by UGC for SC, ST, OBC and other minorities has been functioning in the college very effectively for the last five years. The program offered coaching classes for the students in bank test, various exams conducted by UPSC and KPSC, special practice for national and state eligibility tests. Almost 180 students have been benefited by this scheme.

Equal opportunity cell:

Equal opportunity cell for the marginalized students has special relevance to the college on account of this being the only Government College in Kerala with more than 20 percentage tribal participation. Naturally the cell has tried to mingle academic activities with extracurricular fields and other creative realms. The major activity focused by the cell includes classes in personality development, training in career orientation and character building. Sahithya Vedi

A literary club has been functioning in the college for the last two years under the wings of the Department of Oriental Languages. The club has been instrumental in publishing a host of creative stuff from the students in leading Malayalam periodicals such as *Mathrbhumi*, *Madhyamam*, and *Deshabhimani*. - To arrange stage presentation of tribal arts such as Gaddika, Folk Dance, Folk Song etc.

- To create awareness among the students regarding the purity, diversity and sacredness of tribal ritual and non ritual performances.

The total numbers of beneficiaries of this club are 60.

Film and Drama Club

The Film and Drama Club has been functioning in the college as it has been sensitizing the students about the social and cultural ideology behind the theatre. It has also been training them in different facets of performance. Several popular films and plays were screened and discussions were conducted on their structural and functional dynamics. A collection of films and plays have also been produced on stage or through camera by talented students in the college. Some of the students have also been blessed with a few awards for their films. About 40 students are benefited through these activities as we have a well-furnished digital theatre as our venue.

Green Army Club

Green army club has been initiated in the college with the view of creating environmental consciousness among the students and making them aware of the importance of forestry. A star forest has been initiated with this aim. The green army has also been promoting organic farming in the campus.

2.3.8. Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty members during the last four years?

The Institution has been trying to tune with the rapid changes in the structural and functional framework of higher education. Maximum efforts have been taken to make the learning process more student centric and technical in nature. These radical transformations have been initiated by the replacement of black board with interactive whiteboards in all the class rooms. Other significant achievements in this spectrum are given below:

- After the introduction of CCSS /CBCCSS learning is more student centric through the introduction of assignments, seminars, projects and other ICT enabled techniques in curriculum. In this respect we have been encouraging our students for ICT enabled class room presentation, online submission of assignments and maximum use of available technical resources such as INFLIBNET, DELNET and so on.

- The recently installed edusat classroom has been giving a global direction for the students in the learning process.
- IQAC has been conducting orientation classes for both students and teachers to equip them with modern technical devices.
- We have also installed facilities such as a high speed broadband Wi-Fi connectivity, a public addressing system and well furnished digital theatre.
- The campus radio has been educating besides entertaining them.
- Several films, plays and video presentation which are part of the curriculum have been screened and demonstrated.
- Students are coming up with wonderful documentaries.
- Mass communication students get opportunity to cover edit and record major activities and events in the campus.
- Visit to industry, media, archives and centers of excellence have been organized as a part of curricular enrichment.
- The students have been motivated to gather information beyond the textbooks through e-books, blogs, websites, e-libraries, Sodh Ganga and so on.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

- Digitalization of the Library has been a significant achievement during the last few years. The bar-coding process has been initiated to ensure its smooth functioning. In addition to highly resourceful books, the Library also subscribes to a number of nationally and internationally acclaimed e-journals and print journals. DELNET is a good example for it. All the students and staff are given open access to all the facility including INFLIBNET. A catalogue is also displayed in the college website.
- The library also welcomes membership from the local residents and other celebrated readers for ensuring the maximum utilization of the capital in the library. It also subscribes a host of periodicals, magazines and chronicles to update its knowledge base and to create awareness among the students on the emerging trends in different disciplines.

- In addition to the general Library, all the major departments have a Library of well picked books.
- About 3000 books have been purchased under entry in service scheme and a huge share of them guides the students to different competitive exams at the national and regional level.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The college practices a punctual method of covering the syllabus in time. Any unexpected losses of working days are compensated through extra hours and special classes on holidays.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The members of the faculty regularly collect feedback from the students to improve themselves in the teaching process. The department heads ensure systematic implementation of continuous evaluation patterns by other faculty members. Feedbacks from parents are also respected. Teachers are also advised to improve their teaching strategy on the basis of the results in internal and external examinations. The work diaries of the teachers are regularly supervised by the heads of the departments.

2.4 TEACHER QUALITY

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

The vacancy positions of the college are reported to the Directorate of Collegiate Education, Govt. of Kerala. They in turn authorize the Kerala Public Service Commission (KPSC), Govt. of Kerala to fill the vacancies. The KPSC selects eligible candidates for appointments through a process involving written test and interview. Rank lists are prepared after taking into consideration the prevailing rules and regulations of reservation. As per the advice of KPSC, the Director of Collegiate Education appoints the faculty members.

As per the guidance of DCE the college has also been appointing guest faculties to ensure that the academic tasks are fulfilled systematically and punctually. The usual guidelines of DCE with regard to their appointment have been vehemently followed. As regards the retention strategies of the college, the institution provides ample measures to enhance and update the teacher's potentials.

Facilities such as well-equipped library, EDUSAT studio with provisions for teleconferencing, high speed broad band connectivity, teleprompter for training Mass Communication students in news reading and wide varieties of cameras to create a photographic consciousness among students have been arranged.

The college facilitates and motivates the faculty to undertake both minor and major research projects and avail faculty development programs.

The college has an exhaustive and resourceful publication division to promote the scholarly writing among faculty.

Owing to its very compact nature, the college offers cordial working atmosphere and good rapport with stakeholders.

Rajan (Commerce expert), Sri T.G. Biju (Journalist PTI), E P Rajagopalan (Cultural critic), Dr. Umar Thasneem (English Writer), Pro. Hameed Chendamangaloor (Social Activist) and so on have been visiting our campus and the interactions with them have sufficiently upgraded the academic base of our teachers.

Teaching learning methods/approaches

Faculty members training programs organized by the institution

- The IQAC organised two seminars for the introduction of the procedures with regard to NAAC and promotion of IT skills among the teachers and students to empower and enable the use of various tools and technology for improving teaching and learning.
- The CCSS co-ordinator of the college was deputed to attend the workshop in the University on new choice based credit and semester system for under graduate students. The college organized a training session under the leadership of the trained faculty member.

This program was successfully conducted by the major as well as minor departments.

2.4.4 What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (eg: providing research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications teaching experience in other national institutions and specialized programs industrial engagement etc.)

The college provides utmost encouragements to faculty members for doing research, for attending seminars/workshops/trainings, availing FDP with salary protection and study leave even before completing probation.

Two faculty members have been granted minor research projects and other three are working for the same.

Three of the faculty members have availed FDP of UGC.

Three faculty members have been awarded PhDs.

One of the faculty members has submitted her doctoral thesis and one is in the culmination stage of her research.

Nine faculty members are pursuing part time PhD.

A faculty in the department of physics is in the final stage of his thesis from Indian Institute of Space Technology, Under Department of Space, Government of India.

One faculty was awarded post-doctoral fellowship from University of Misoram.

The college started a publication division in the previous academic year. The college has three academic publications to its credit. *Sooruma*, the publication of the papers presented in a seminar held under the auspicious of Department of Malayalam has been the first one. The college also published a Research journal called '*Explorations*' containing research articles of Teachers in the college from various disciplines. The articles of Prof. P C Ramankutty, the retired faculty of the college, a renowned writer, social worker and activist were collected and published on the eve of his retirement under the title *Ezhuthukrishi*. The college also published a news letter called *Little Narratives* to illustrate the major activities in the college.

Six faculty members are undergoing training under FLAIR.

2.4.5 Give the number of faculty members who received awards / recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching during the last four years. Enunciate how the institutional culture and environment contributed to such performance/achievement of the faculty members.

Mrs. Priya P, HOD, Department of History have won National level Prof. Parthesarathy Guptha and J.C. Jha Memorial Award for best paper 'Popular Distress and Second World War' in the Modern India Session of National Historical congress 2013. Our teachers are regularly publishing papers in reputed journals and details are given in the concerned section.

Mr. Kabeer K.T, Officer in Charge of NCC attended the three months training program PRCN/SD/156 at Officers Training Academy at Nagpur and got commissioned as Lieutenant in the army wing of NCC.

Dr. Saji R Kurup was selected as the best Program Officer of NSS in the University of Kannur during the year 2012-13.

2.4.6. Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

The feedback is collected from students regularly at the end of each semester by IQAC through a specially designed questionnaire by IQAC. The teachers are graded on the basis of the feedback. Creative measures are advised to the teachers without affecting their morale. The feedback of the Alumni and Parents are also received in their regularly convened meetings. All constructive suggestions are imparted in the future academic transactions.

2.5 EVALUATION PROCESS AND REFORMS

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty members are aware of the evaluation processes?

The orientation program on the initial day of the course gives the detailed picture of the evaluation to both students and parents. The heads of departments and tutors give additional instruction on the same in the department. Students are also given previous year question papers to learn about question patterns. Model examinations conducted at the end of each semester make the students more thorough about the evaluation methodology of the University examination. In this age of IT, the faculties are regularly informed of the changes in evaluation pattern through University websites, college mailing group, Whatsapp communities, publications of service organizations and so on. The representatives of the college in the annual University conferences disseminate the information to others through combined sessions.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The college does not have any flexibility concerning the evaluation methods and it follows norms prescribed by the university. The university of Calicut to which the college is affiliated has introduced Choice based credit and semester system(CCSS), which launched the direct grading system as the method of evaluation at the degree level with effect from academic year 2009 onwards. It is a continuous process which includes both internal and external evaluation. In the internal assessment weighted grade points are awarded to attendance, seminar, assignments and two class tests. The final score of internal assessment is awarded on a five point scale for art subjects and seven point scales in computer science. Though, the college abides the rules and regulations of evaluation process prescribed by the University of Calicut, innovative evaluations strategies such as mock viva, debates and discussions etc. are conducted. The combined internal mark sheets are displayed on the notice board and SSR- NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta

complaints if any, are ratified through the internal grievance redressal mechanism. Thus the fairness in continuous evaluation is ensured from the part of the Institution.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The college strictly adheres to the evaluation pattern prescribed by the University of Calicut. The Department coordinators and college coordinator monitor the continuous evaluation process. Complaints if any are monitored by the students' redressal grievance mechanism.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adapted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

The formative evaluation is done through assignment, seminars, projects internal exams and model examination. The classroom activities promote a spirit of harmony, cooperation and research aptitude among the students. Naturally, students have an inclination to spend more time in the library and in internet. Model examinations at the end of each semester are designed as a pre requisite to prepare the students for University examinations.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills, etc.)

The guidelines of the university regarding the internal assessment are meticulously followed by the institution. Parameters such as 75% of attendance, pass in internal exams, timely submission of assignments and effective presentation of seminar are strictly taken into consideration while awarding marks to the students. The emotional and communicative skills of the students are improved through their presentations. The college has a three tier mechanism for solving the grievances regarding internal assessment including the concerned teacher, the heads of the department and the internal grievance redressal cell.

2.5.6 What are the graduates attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The primary task of the institution is to mould our students as socially responsible citizens in the country. We cherish such positive values as secularism, SSR- NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta

collective consciousness, scientific temper, altruism, spirit of nationalism, environmental consciousness and so on. These values are recognized through community living camp of NSS, service of the students in tribal colony, actions in the palliative care, red ribbon club, anti-drug campaign, participation in the national integration camps, NCC, NSS and other clubs. The management fest in the college have been providing administrative and leadership qualities to students. The new Initiatives of Kerala government like WWS, ASAP and SSP do significant contributions in this areas.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

The college has a three tier mechanism to solve the grievance of students regarding the internal assessment. It consists of concerned teacher in the primary level, the HOD in the secondary level and the student's grievance redressal cell as the final institutional source. The cell chaired by the Principal contains senior faculty and heads. Those complaints which are not satisfactorily solved within the institution can be forwarded by the students to the University grievance redressal cell. At the University level, the students are given options for revaluation if they are not happy with their present grade.

2.6 STUDENT PERFORMANCE AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If yes, give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these.

Yes the college is very vigilant to foster learning out comes. The college envisages developing the institution as a center of higher learning. The mission of the college is to inculcate outcomes of social commitment among youth and equip them professionally. The college has devised its vision and mission which are displayed in prominent spots within the campus premises. The curriculum and the syllabi of the academic programs offered in this college are conducted in such a way that, these objectives are materialized by the successful completion of the program. The department has clearly stated learning out comes for each program that ultimately supports the institutional goals and objectives and integrates the vision and mission of the college.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/program? The internal and external results are recorded systematically in the concerned departments. The examination results and achievements of students are analyzed periodically in the college council and department council. The results are evaluated and communicated to parents during class PTA.

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

Intended learning outcomes are achieved through focused teaching plans, assignments, seminars, and group discussions. In order to equip students with online informations, the institution provides the students with internet access, INFLIBNET facility, EDUSAT and these faculties help the students to collect up to date information for learning.

Exam calendars prepared by the university help the teacher to finish the lessons in time. It also helps the students to plan and study the syllabus within stipulated time.

The institution promotes field visits, industrial visits, annual study tour, visit to historically important places, trekking, etc. Bird watching camps and nature camps are being conducted by the college. The college planned a project named star forest in collaboration with the department of social forestry to make the campus more eco friendly. By participating in NSS, NCC and red ribbon club, the students become socially responsible individuals.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality Jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

Equal opportunity cell and Entrepreneurial club encourages the students for self employment through various training programs such as soap making, jewelry making, etc. The NSS, Pain and Palliative Club, Red Ribbon Club, compulsory social service scheme etc. are aimed to develop moral and ethical values and social commitment. The career guidance and placement cell in the college helps the students to enhance the career opportunity and skill development. Study tours, industrial visits and nature camps give the students an out of class experience.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

We assess the student progress through continuous evaluation. The cumulative progress is assessed in the university examinations. On the basis of result analysis, the weak students are identified and are given special training on their academically weak areas through UGC sponsored Remedial coaching program and scholar support program (SSP).

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

Tutorial sessions and mentoring sessions enable the teachers to assess the learning outcomes of the students. Internal examination, seminars, presentations and university examination results are strategies used to monitor the achievement of

learning out comes. Course feedback is collected from the outgoing students and their suggestions are given due consideration. The institution ensures the achievement of learning out comes in terms of student progression to higher studies and employment.

2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If yes, provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Yes, student assignment, seminar presentations and tests are considered as best indications of students' performance. Internal grades are awarded on the basis of timely submission of assignments, seminars and scores achieved in test papers. Forty five days of social service is compulsory for the award of bachelor degree.

Criterion III

RESEARCH, EXTENSION AND CONSULTANCY

INTRODUCTION

During the last five years, there has been considerable increase in the research and extension activities of the campus. Most of the faculties are either completed or ongoing their doctoral studies. A research committee has been supervising and guiding such activities. The College has published a research Journal under the auspices of the research and publication committee. All the major and minor departments have conducted national seminars and lecture series on the concerned discipline. There has also been rapid increase in the number of publications by the faculties. The representation in the board of studies and research guideship has also been increased. Several faculties have either completed or are continuing their minor and major research projects.

3.1. PROMOTION OF RESEARCH

3.1.1. Does the institution have recognized research centre/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

Our college is not a recognized research centre of any of the Universities. However, we have one recognized Research guide . Dr. Saji. R. Kurup, Assistant Professor of Hindi is a recognized Research guide of Hindi Prachar Sabha, Kerala.

3.1.2 Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

Yes. There is a college level research committee under the chairmanship of the Principal (ex-officio). In addition, the committee has a convener and six members representing different Departments.

A Research Journal '*Explorations*' was published by collecting articles from the faculty of the different disciplines under the supervision of the committee. Major recommendations of the committee and their outcome are given below:

- The Research committee requested the Principal to encourage maximum teachers for doing major and minor research projects.
- As per the recommendations of the committee, all Departments have submitted proposals for seminars, and have organized a host of such seminars.
- The committee has been trying to collect details of potential sources of funding for research and such information is regularly communicated to the teachers.
- The committee has also been providing the table of orientation and refresher courses conducted by different Universities so as to motivate the faculty for doing such courses.
- The reference section of the library for P.G. students is enlarged as per the recommendation of the committee.
- The students are also been guided to develop research aptitude through the projects and assignments periodically assigned to them.
- Maximum faculty has been encouraged to participate and present papers in external National and International seminars.

- Perfect technical ambiance including high-speed broadband internet connectivity has been ensured in the college by the committee.
- The committee has also been recommending the librarian to subscribe some new print and electronic journals.
- About 10 thousand Research papers published by different universities have been downloaded and kept as a great treasure of knowledge for further research references. It has been made accessible for both students and teachers equally.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

- ***Autonomy to the Principal Investigator:*** The institution offers maximum autonomy to the Principal investigator to involve in and to implement research projects.
- ***Timely availability or release of resources:*** Research committee always ensures the timely availability of all resources for the smooth conduct of various research projects.
- ***Adequate infrastructure and human resources:*** The College offers the entire available infrastructure and other resources to the faculty members for the planning and implementation of research projects.
- ***Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave, etc. to teachers:*** To promote fruitful research, the college assists those who are doing research through FDP from the UGC. There is provision to appoint a fulltime teacher in lieu of the researcher.

- ***Support in terms of technology and information needs:*** The college provides broadband Wi-Fi internet facility in all the departments. There are various research journals and reference materials available in the Central Library. Sufficient numbers of personal computer systems and laptops have been provided to the departments for facilitating research activities.
- ***Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities:*** The college office ensures the preparation and timely submission of the utilization certificates and auditing of research funds.
- ***Any other:*** Research committee facilitates publication of research output of faculty members. A journal called '*Explorations*' is published by the research committee, including the articles of faculty from different disciplines of the college. The research paper presented in the seminar conducted by the Department of Malayalam, during 2007 is published by the committee in association with the publication division of the college, with the title '*Sooruma*' during the last year.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The institution has been taking all the available steps to promote scientific temper and research culture among the students while upholding the spirit of fundamental duty in our constitution. Students have been given assignments, seminars and projects so as to strengthen their attitude to research. The students have been taught research methodology including MLA/APA style by the doctoral faculty in the college. The strict adherence to such principles has been ensured in the projects, assignments and seminars presented by them. They have been also made members in different committees to enhance the research culture. The UGC initiatives like '*SodhGanga*' have been introduced to the students to accelerate their skill and opportunities for research. They have been sufficiently guided towards the content, and the style of thesis production. The interaction with eminent academicians in the campus has also been instrumental in nourishing the research culture of the students.

Commerce are encouraged to do researches as part of their projects, even though, we are not able to give them financial assistance for the research. All the available facilities in the campus such as the Library, INFLIBNET, Broadband, Printers, scanners and so on are provided to them for free of cost.

- Dr. Anil, Department of Commerce, while studying about the Kerala tea plantations, fused Commerce with Economics, Sociology and Environmental Studies.

- Mr. Santhosh T.C. from the Dept. Of Commerce, also combined Sociology, Commerce and Human Resource Management in his analysis of the job satisfaction of the tea plantation workers
- Mr. Laril James form the Department of Commerce, in his study of the pharmaceutical medicine, combined Commerce with medical sector
- Mr. Laiju, in his study of the employees of Indian Coffee House combined Commerce with Sociology and Human Resource Management

3.3 RESEARCH FACILITIES

3.3.1 What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?

The laboratory facilities are provided to the students for doing their project works. Most of the modern tools and equipments are available in science laboratories. A well-equipped computer lab is provided to the UG and PG students to type and print their project reports. Internet facility is also made available to the students in the Learning Resource Centre in the Central Library. The students have been given freedom to consult faculty members of any department for proper completion of the projects. Orientation classes on Research Methodology are also given to the students by utilizing the faculty members of various departments. IQAC conducted a workshop on ICT. Dr. Varghese Vaidhyan, UGC NAAC peer team member inaugurated the workshop.

3.3.2 What are the institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers, especially in the new and emerging areas of research?

The college encourages the faculty to avail maximum research funds offered by UGC, Government and other agencies. In addition to the General Lab, a special Digital Lab is constructed for the M.Com students. A special lab has also been constructed for Computer Science and Physics Departments. The Library also subscribes some magazines and publications with a research orientation and the reading section of the library is considerably enlarged with this perspective.

3.3.3 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facilities? If yes, what are the instruments/facilities created during the last four years?

The college has received research grant from funding agencies and no grant is given by any beneficiary agency.

The college is highly flexible in the case of providing our facility for external researchers both among the faculty and the students. Dr, Saji R Kurup from the Department of Hindi has been guiding three M.Phil theses and one PhD among which one M.Phil is already completed. The Scholars under him have been availing all the resources and technical facilities in the campus. The resources in the library are supplied to external researchers on condition. They are also allowed to use the special reference section for Commerce and reading room facility in the Department of Commerce.

3.3.5 Provide details on the library/ information resource center or any other facilities available specifically for the researchers?

The college has a well- equipped library with 22167 titles, 23 periodicals, 49 journals and a collection of e-journals. A huge collection of research papers are downloaded in different subjects from ‘Shodh Ganga’. These are made available in General Lab, Library and all Departmental computers. Other facilities of research include high-speed broadband, INFLIBNET, DELNET, EDUSAT studio, and so on. A special reference section is also organised for the benefit of MCom students.

- The Study of Dr. Ansar on the impact of globalization on the small scale industries of Kerala provides a clear perspective on the challenges faced by small scale industries in Kerala in the eve of globalization.
- The study of Mr. Sajith on the land alienation of tribals in Wayanad has shed new light in the domestic question of tribals and their passion for land as a means of survival.
- The study of Mr. Nasar has focused the positive and negative aspects of tourism among the weaker section of Wayanad.

Thus most of the researches finished and ongoing by the member of the faculty of the college have clear cut social and cultural significance in the empirical life of the people of Wayanad.

S, and Mr. Anoop Thankachan and the faculty from the Department of English, Mr. Akbar C have offered classes to the Higher Secondary teachers with regard to the formation of their new curriculum. Mr. P. C Ashraff from the Department of Malayalam has been instrumented in collecting and publishing the history of a reputed Malayalee

association called BPMJ. Dr. Saji R Kurup, from the Department of Hindi has offered classes about Official Language to the employees of Central University of Kerala.

The college offers all its available facilities to the faculty for free of cost in order to ensure maximum utilization of their consultancy services. The teaching loads of such faculty who use these services are arranged conveniently so as to promote their extra activities.

3.6 EXTENSION ACTIVITIES AND INSTITUTIONAL SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY (ISR)

3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution-neighborhood- community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

- We have two National Service Scheme (NSS) units which together consist of 200 volunteers.

The objective of NSS is to achieve personality development of the students through community service. Our unit won ‘Best Red Ribbon Club’ award for the year 2015. Being a socially responsible institution, our college has undertaken several activities to promote our neighborhood community, contributing to good citizenship and service mentality. A variety of projects were implemented by the National Service Scheme Units of NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta over the last 4 years. The important projects undertaken are:

- NSS units have adopted a Tribal colony named ‘Padapuram Colony’ and undertaken the education of the students of the colony.
 - Provided facilities such as benches, desks, umbrellas etc. to the children in the colony. Encouraged the students of the colony to do PSC online registration.
 - Agriculture is yet another activity carried out to promote the neighbourhood community.
 - Conducting blood donation camp, blood group determination camps, flash mob at major towns for making awareness among the society.
 - Observance of National and International days of importance and the conveyance of the message of the day to the students & the community.
 - Anti-drug campaigns, both at the campus and community level.
 - Visits to old age homes, child care centers, etc. and spending time with the deprived sections of the community.
 - AIDS awareness campaign in higher secondary classes of nearby institutions.
 - Environmental protection programs and the plantation of tree saplings.
 - Awareness programs on Voluntary blood donation.
 - Construction and maintenance of roads, canals, play grounds, etc.
 - Pain and Palliative care.
 - Socio-economic surveys.
 - Participation in the reconstruction of areas affected by natural calamities.
 - Special Camping programs consisting of the construction and maintenance of physical assets, Socio-economic surveys, Health awareness, Anti-drug campaigns, etc.

- In connection with the District Health department, Police and Excise, NSS has successfully organised an 'Anti-Drug forum' for the past two years named Sanjeevani. As a part of this, poster making and essay writing competitions have been conducted for school students throughout the district. This mission has been a great success. In addition to this, the NSS volunteers have also attended Nature camps, specifically two camps at Thirunelly in 2015 and one at Kavungal in 2014. Our volunteers have also completed Trauma care training held at Calicut in 2013 and has also achieved license in this area. Moreover we have an active Pain & Palliative Club which undertakes homecare services twice a month. Our students have a good participation in the sale of umbrella made by the Palliative patients of Medical College, Kozhikode and we also take sufficient care in distributing medicines for them timely. Our Pain and Palliative club has always been a token of love and affection to poor and orphan patients. It also takes due concern in observing nationally important days. We have conducted various awareness and orientation classes in order to promote students to save nature. We also find time to celebrate major festivals with the socially ignored ones such as providing Onam kit for Palliative patients in the district. Another major project is House Construction in the year 2013-14. In addition to this, we have jewelry making unit, Umbrella making unit, paper bag and chalk making facilities of our own. Students improve their talents as well as contribute a small amount for social work by engaging in these activities. NSS has also been helping the socially disadvantaged groups such as visually challenged in multiple areas such as celebrating important days, conducting rallies, volunteering assistance , recording text books and so on. NSS had also organised a dress bank program of collecting and distributing old dresses from the people to the needy orphans. These programs have been helpful to promote institution-community linkage and thereby to achieve good citizenship, service orientation and the overall development of the students.
- Compulsory Social Service (CSS) Program of the University of Calicut is also used to establish institute-community linkage.

- The college NCC has also been doing commendable services in this respect. Our NCC cadets have been helping the deprived sections such as senior citizens, disabled and so on in multiple ways and occasions. Our students have also been actively involving in the parades held at the district headquarters during Independence Day and Republic Day. The students have also been assisting the Police Department during elections and ‘meet the people program’ organised by the chief minister of the state.

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students’ involvement in various social movements/activities which promote citizenship roles?

The institution takes all possible measures to track the social involvement of the students and to develop them as good citizens: NCC, NSS, GREEN ARMY and other various clubs become significant platforms for increasing the social and national orientation of the students. 3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/International agencies?

Students are periodically enrolled to NSS and NCC during the beginning of each academic year. Proper orientation is given to them in this respect. The faculty and students are encouraged to participate in all extension activities. The service of the faculty is appreciated by the institution by giving certificates which will become instrumental in upgrading their status quo in performance based appraisal as a part of 6th pay commission under UGC. Students are awarded grace marks and certificates on the basis of their performance which definitely give them better options for higher studies. Participation in NSS is limited to 200 students. Applications are received from students and after proper observation and personal interview; they are enrolled to this scheme. Students to NCC are directly recruited by the officers of 30th Kerala Battalion, Calicut head quarters. The process of the enrollment includes orientation programs, screening tests, physical tests and final interviews.

3.6.6 Give details on social surveys, research or extension work (if any) undertaken by the college to ensure social justice and empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society?

Social surveys are the integral part of the regular activities and special camping program of the National Service Scheme units. It ensures social justice and empowers students from under privileged and vulnerable sections of the society. Following are the details of the social surveys undertaken by NSS units of our college:

- Water purity test was conducted by collecting samples of water from houses in Kalpetta Municipality. It was held in the academic year 2012-13.
- A survey to identify the cancer patients and kidney patients in Kalpetta Municipality in collaboration with the Health Department in the academic year 2014-15.
- A community survey was undertaken by NSS on 26-12-2011 in Vythiri Tribal Colony as a part of its special Camping Program.
- A socio-economic survey with health awareness campaign was conducted by the NSS on 24-12-2013 in Munderi Tribal Colony.
- NSS units are also bound to communicate the findings of the survey to the authorities of Local Self Governments for further analysis and remedies. Follow-up measures such as the distribution of dress materials, cleaning of the premises, health awareness campaigns, anti-drug campaigns, etc were also undertaken by the units.
- A Pain and Palliative Care unit is functioning in the college to help the chronically ill patients who need continuous supportive care. In collaboration with the Pain and Palliative Society, Kalpetta, the students have been participating in the home visits of chronically ill patients in the surrounding areas.

3.6.7 Reflecting on objectives and expected outcomes of the extension activities organized by the institution, comment on how they complement students' academic learning experience and specify the values and skills inculcated.

Programs conducted by NSS, NCC and other clubs have been instrumental in cultivating certain core values, principles and attitudes among the students.

- Through the activities of Red Ribbon Club and antidrug forum students got greater awareness about the health issues in the contemporary society.
- Through their association with palliative patients, disabled persons and tribals, the students have been sensitized about the issues faced by the marginalized group in the society and the need of greater compassion and empathy for them.
- The community living camps conducted by NSS and NCC have provided a spirit of togetherness and a sense of belonging to the students. It has further promoted their socializing process by adding new emotional and intellectual dimensions.
- Such camps have also been crucial in developing certain essential values such as freedom for positive disagreement, respecting the opponents, right to disagree, competence to cooperate in spite of differences, and democratic distribution of social rolls among the students.

3.6.8 How does the institution ensure the involvement of the community in its reach-out activities and contribute to the community development? Detail on the initiatives of the institution that encourage community participation in its activities?

As a part of the public initiatives of the institution, the required authorities are contacted in advance. The activities of Red Ribbon Club and blood donation forum are done in co-operation with the District and Taluk Hospitals. The anti- drug campaigns of NSS are guided by the District Excise Departments. As a part of the NSS Community living camp, an organising committee is formed by including the representatives of the local self government, political figures and other prominent social activists from the surroundings of the venue of the camp. In some of our programs we also ensure the support of district and local administration.

CRITERION IV

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

INTRODUCTION

The infrastructural facilities of the campus have been considerably amplified during the last five years. Some of the major constructions include college auditorium, a new administrative block, Science block, edusat room, ladies hostel and a play ground with 400 meter track. The reading facility of the Library is also extended.

4.1 PHYSICAL FACILITIES

4.1.1. Institutional Policies for Creation/Enhancement of Infrastructure for Effective Teaching and Learning:

Being a Government institution, the policies for creation and enhancement of basic infrastructure such as buildings, furniture, library, modern teaching aids, etc. are directly linked with policies and budget allocation of state government and also with other funding agencies like UGC, NABARD, etc. However, at the institutional level, it is our constant endeavour to do as much as we can for the creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching-learning. For that we have a master plan of the institution, keeping in view of the future infrastructural requirements of the college. The Planning and Implementation committee of the college under the chairmanship of the Principal submits plans and proposals for infrastructure development to Government of Kerala and the UGC from time to time. The Department of Collegiate Education in consultation with the college authorities have been implementing the construction works phase by phase through the implementing agencies of the government such as PWD, SIDCO, etc.

4.1.2. Details of the facilities available for:

A) Curricular and co-curricular activities:

- **Classroom:** The College has 17 spacious, well ventilated classrooms of varying sizes with adequate seating facility for learners in the existing block. Besides this, Computer Science Department block includes a state of the art smart digital lab with ability to connect up to 50 nodes with twenty fully networked desktops.
- **Technology enabled learning space:** Out of the 17 classrooms, 11 are equipped with LCD projectors and Interactive white boards. Besides this, the general computer laboratory with 15 computer systems, EDUSAT Studio and digital theatre, Learning Resource Centre and the well-equipped Seminar hall also serve as technology enabled learning spaces available in the college.
- **Seminar Hall:** The Seminar hall is well equipped with audiovisual facilities and modern amenities, serves the purpose of an Indoor Auditorium. It is used to conduct seminars of different streams and for the other functions of the college.
- **Tutorial space:** Departmental classrooms and staff rooms are usually used for tutorial purposes.
- **Laboratories:** Computer, Physics and Mass communication laboratories are well established in the college. These are meant for conducting practical classes and project works of the respective subjects. Computer laboratory is also used to conduct Add-on Courses and to train the students under Additional Skill Acquisition Program (ASAP).
- **Bio Diversity Park:** The college situates in a total area of 25 acres. An area of 8.5 acre is protected as a marshland in which a number of variety species from flora and fauna has been identified. In addition to that the remaining area of the campus where there is no building construction is preserved as very good bio-diversity park.
- **Specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research:** The college has facilities and equipments in the computer science and Physics laboratories for the teaching-learning of undergraduate students. Department of History has a well maintained Heritage museum. Department of Mass communication has a well equipped laboratory with a Campus Radio Station and a visual editing studio using Adobe Premiere and 32 inch LED TV with DTH connection is also available in the department to enlighten the students about the day to day updates. In addition, they regularly conduct media visit and news reading training with Tele-Prompter. The students make short films and documentaries as part of their curriculum. The department has 5 movie cameras and 5 DSLR cameras which enable the students to

familiarize with the new technologies of videography and photography. The Department of Physics has a well equipped lab with modern equipments. A Digital Electronics Lab is also functioning in the Physics Lab with facilities to train the students with advanced digital technologies which include wireless technologies. Currently all the class rooms in the Department are ICT enabled and wirelessly connected to hyper space. All the electronic devices are backed by 8 KVA UPS supply, 24x7 hours .The Department is Wi-Fi enabled with WPA2 security and available in 2.5GHz spectrum with a minimum of 2 Mbps speed and coverage of 50 meters radially.

○ ***Collaborations and Inter-disciplinary Research:***

Computer Science Department of the college is constantly encouraging the students and faculties of the institution with the motto ‘Research for the Society’. The department has collaborations with Agricultural Universities, Government Hospitals and various Government Agencies. Currently an Online spoken tutorial in association with IIT Bombay and MHRD is available for the students and faculty. FOSS (Free and Open Source Software) forum of the Department give trainings to promote free software. Faculty of the Department are also engaged in Research on Geographical Information Systems, Pattern Recognition and Nuclear Physics in association with various Universities and Premier Institutes of Scientific Importance.

B) Extra-curricular Activities:

- ***Sports:*** The ground in the college serves as the practice venue for outdoor disciplines like football, Cricket, Athletics and Badminton. The college has been facilitating for indoor disciplines like Karate and Judo training for girls during the last five years.
- ***Gymnasium:*** the college gymnasium is facilitated with enough equipments for exercises in a very spacious room.
- ***Auditorium:*** The Seminar hall serves the function of an indoor Auditorium. Besides that, a permanent 500 seating capacity Auditorium named ‘Sarangi’ is available for conducting public functions like arts festivals, college day celebrations, university level arts festivals etc.
- ***NSS:*** The college has two NSS units with 200 students of first and Second Year UG Program, which covers 40% of the total student strength of the college. All the students must be enrolled in Compulsory Social Service Scheme as part of their curriculum.
- ***NCC:*** The college has an NCC unit 30 Kerala battalion, with a strength of 107 students. Recently college NCC officer in charge Mr. Kabeer K.T has been awarded Lieutenant Rank.

- **Cultural Activities:** Various stage and off-stage events are undertaken by the institution to develop and encourage creative talents of students like Fine arts festival, College day celebrations, etc. The Fine Arts Secretary of the students' Union, with the help of the Staff Advisor and Fine Arts Advisor plans and executes such cultural festivals. The winners are encouraged to participate in Inter-collegiate and university level competitions.
- **Public Speaking & Communication Skills:** Recitation, debates and elocution competitions are held every year as part of the cultural events under the supervision of the college union. The winners are sent to inter-collegiate and university level competitions. In addition to this, there are similar such events organized under various clubs and associations. As a regular activity, students are given opportunity to enhance their communication skills by conducting classroom interactions, classroom seminars and also encouragement to participate in different functions of the college. Film shows to foster communication skills in English, are undertaken regularly in the EDUSAT Studio and Seminar Hall. Election to the students union is preceded by a 'Meet the Candidate' program in which the oratorical skill of the candidate helps in electoral victory to a large extent.
- **Health and Hygiene:** The Department of Physical education offers an open Course to create awareness in health and hygiene. We are also utilizing the gymnasium facility available in the college for promoting a healthy lifestyle through physical exercise. First-aid boxes are available at the college office, NSS Room and at all the departments. The institution makes use of the services of the nearby Government Hospital and private hospitals in case of medical emergencies. We are trying to maintain a clean environment with the help of establishments like Nature Club, Green Army Club and NSS which continuously strive for a clean and green campus. Safe drinking water and dust bins are made available at various locations in the college. Blood donation forum in our college got best achievement award during the last academic year at State level.

4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? - The need for expansion and effective use of available infrastructure are identified and discussed in the college council at the beginning of every academic year. As an
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immediate follow-up, detailed plan and estimates were submitted to the funding agencies. As and when funds are sanctioned, the purchase committee meets and takes resolutions for the effective utilization of the funds within the stipulated time. Examples of the facilities developed/augmented:

- Construction of administrative block is in progress.
- Science Block is nearing completion with three class rooms and two laboratories and department library.
- Central Library was modified by constructing different sections like Reference, PG, Circulation and Reading Area.
- Fully functioned EDUSAT Studio with sufficient audio-visual facilities.
- Teaching aids such as desktop computers, laptops, LCD projectors and interactive white boards have been in use for effective teaching- learning and conducting seminars.

to the staff members. Staff members are also covered under Group Personal Accident Insurance Scheme, Group Insurance Scheme & State Life Insurance scheme of the state government.

- ***IQAC:*** A well-furnished room on the first floor of the main block is provided with computers, multi-function device and Internet facility to act as the IQAC Office.
- ***Canteen:*** The college canteen is located in front of the main block. The canteen serves tea and other beverages, snacks and meals to the staff and students of the college at a concessional rate during the college hours.
Total Carpet Area of the Canteen: 1100 sq feet
Total Seating Capacity: 40 Persons
- ***Recreational Space for Staff and students:*** On different occasions, the seminar hall and permanent auditorium of the college are utilized for recreational purposes of the staff and students. Staff Recreation room is the major arena for the recreation of staff members. Girl students of the college have a separate space (Ladies' Waiting Room) ensuring privacy which is used variously as recreation room, prayer hall, rest room, etc.
- ***Safe drinking water facility:*** The college has ensured continuous supply of safe drinking water, through several water purifiers installed in different spots.
- ***Auditorium:*** A permanent auditorium is used for hosting different functions. The college seminar hall serves also as an indoor auditorium.
- ***Digital Theatre:*** Seminar Hall is equipped with modern technology, lighting and acoustic requirements and an LCD projector.
- ***Ladies' Waiting Room:*** It is housed in a separate building adjacent to main lock which is used by the girl students of the college for rest and recreation.
- ***Store:*** A Stationery Store maintained by the co-operative society is located at the second floor of the new block. It provides text books, notebooks and stationery items to the students and staff at a discount rate. Photocopying facility is also available at the store.



- New arrivals are displayed, and back issues of magazines and journals are maintained in the archives. Employment News weekly, Journals, Magazines and previous year's university question papers, etc. are made available in the library.
- German technology based water purifier provides hot, cold and normal water in all working hours.
- Free wi-fi facility available in all working hours
- Five fire extinguishers are fixed in the library as a part of book preservation.

No visually challenged student is presently enrolled in the institution. In addition to the regular business with the library, for differently-able users, books will be provided at their class rooms on request, with the help of attenders.

In order to improve the quality and facilities, the college library collects feedback through a suggestion box placed at the entrance of library. - Borrowing limit (number of books issued at a time) of students was enhanced.
- Decided to keep the library open between 9.30am to 4.30 pm on all working days without any break.

- Structural modification of the library such as circulation section, reading areas, reference section, PG Section, etc. were planned and executed.

4.3.2 Detail on the computer and internet facility made available to the faculty and students on the campus and off-campus?

The institution avails 20 high-speed internet connections (BSNL Broadband) which have been installed in different departments, the central library, computer lab, IQAC office and the Administrative Office. Computer and internet facilities are available in the campus 24x7. There are 45 computers with Internet facility. The ratio of connected computers (with internet facility) to students is approximately 1:11. The students can easily view college updates on the college website available at the URL www.nsmcollege.ac.in. The Learning Resource Centre of the library offers internet browsing facility to the students during working hours. Wi-Fi facility is freely accessible to the staff members only and is provided to the students on demand.

4.3.3 What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

Since our college is a government institution, the plans and strategies are connected with the policies of the State Govt. and other funding agencies. Institution is highly optimistic regarding the infrastructural upgradation in the near future. The college intends to upgrade the PCs with latest configuration available in the market. Apart from this, the stress is on the purchase of new hardware. Individual upgradation of computers is taken as per requirement. Efforts are being made in the administrative office to upgrade the centralized network to monitor, manage and update all details through server-client infrastructure.

The LCD projectors, internet and other ICT facilities have been paving the way for a student centric environment of learning activities. For example:

- Computer lab and Learning Resource Centre in the library are used not only for learning computer skills, but also for preparing assignments, project reports as well as other course related activities.
- The central library has been made student friendly with the installation of open access initiatives.

State Government and UGC provides fund to maintain the infrastructural facilities. Stock verification is done annually. the maintenance of infrastructure. Technical persons are hired for the maintenance and repairs of laboratory equipments, computers, audio-visual aids, etc. Day-to-day maintenance is carried out by the staff appointed for cleaning and maintenance of buildings. INTRODUCTION

The college consists of students from different geographical, social and economic locations. Socially and economically backward students are provided financial assistance like scholarship and free education. The female students from far off places ought to be provided hostel facilities. Most of the students are promoted for higher studies or they are employed after they leave college. The career counselling cell updates the students regarding various job opportunities and gives information about further studies.

In the university examinations the students of the college have excelled with high percentage of success. The college result has been above

the average of university results during the last four years. Every year, the college publishes academic calendar and annual newsletter. A healthy environment is provided by college to the students through several welfare measures like good Canteen, Gymnasium, Co-operative store, Anti ragging cell, Grievance redressal cell, Career counseling cell, Debate club, Nature club under NSS, Green Army, Film club and literary clubs.

The college consists of an elected students union which participates actively in various co-curricular activities. The student union members have representation in various academic and administrative bodies for smooth functioning of the college. The college has alumni which consist of distinguished people who have excelled in different fields. They work for the overall development of the college and the society.

5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections?

In our college there is an Entry in Service cell. The main aim of this scheme is to help the students belonging to SC, ST, and OBC (non-creamy layer) community. The college is given funds to buy books, journals and periodicals under this scheme and they are available to the needy students of the college. The main aim of this scheme is to support the students to face competitive exams and to get govt. placements. The other measures are:

- Giving separate quota for reservation in admission
- Scholarships are given by the state govt.
- Bus concession is provided in state transport service.
- Remedial coaching is given with financial assistance from UGC.
- Financial assistance from UGC is given for coaching in civil service and state service examinations.
- The career guidance cell of the college provides special training for these students with financial assistance from UGC.
- Stipends are provided by various SC, ST development departments of the govt. SC students get financial aid for study tours from SC development department.

Students with physical disabilities?

Facilities are given for physically challenged students. Peers have been provided to escort them to their classes, to help them in their studies and to take care of them. College takes special efforts to enable physically challenged students to secure Govt. free ships. During tests and university examinations, visually challenged students have a provision for scribes. 3% seats are reserved during admission, UG & PG, for the physically disabled students.

Overseas students?

In some batches Lakshadweep Island students have been studying in the institution

Students to participate in various competitions/National and International?

The college encourages, informs, guides and motivates students to take part in different kinds of co-curricular activities like dance, drama, debating along with different academic events including paper/poster presentations at workshops/seminars organized by various universities, colleges and institutions at national and state levels. On its own, the college arranges Annual programs like competitions on music, quiz, painting, choreography etc. The Cultural Committee of Teacher's and the Students Union encourage student participation in above mentioned programmes throughout the year.

Medical assistance to students: health center, health insurance etc. ?

There is no health centre in the college as many hospitals are situated nearby in case of a medical emergency. NSS and NCC organize awareness programs among the students and teachers about fatal diseases. First aid boxes are available with the college office and departments.

Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams?

A large number of graduated students opt for higher studies. Career Counseling Cell provides updated information about various job opportunities and schedules of different competitive examinations to the passed out students on a regular basis. Some students are employed as school and college teachers through Public Service Commission. A number of students join other services and another fraction of the remaining students are employed in different private companies. A number of students got employment through campus interview organized by the Career Counseling Cell of our college in recent past. UGC funding "Entry in Services" Cell arranges coaching classes for the preparation of examination of Public Service Commission etc. As per SSR- NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta

available information, so far 40 students of our college qualified the NET and 11 students qualified the SET examination and 20 cleared GATE during last five year. Individual departments support students in preparing for NET and JRF examinations by conducting orientation classes during the tutorial sessions. Interactions of students with meritorious alumni are also organized by the departments as motivational exercise. Necessary help and guidance are given to the students participating in such examinations. Sufficient study materials are also provided to all the needy students.

Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.)?

Every year classes are conducted in Spoken English and soft skill training for all students. Training in soft skills is utmost priority as routine soft skill training is conducted in the college with the help of private trainers and also employing the faculty of the college with the financial help of State Plan Fund & UGC. The types of soft skill training recently conducted in the college are given below.

- Spoken English training
- Numerical aptitude
- Personality development
- Interview techniques
- Public speaking & debating
- Computer training

The college has established a separate language lab for the soft skill training for students. The college has a Computer Literacy Program (CLP) center. Special attention to students and community is given by CLP staff in learning basic computing skills and also in INTERNET browsing. The college has central computer center which is open to all the students on all working days. The students are encouraged to utilize this facility to learn the basics of computer. The college has recently started BSc Computer Science Course and a well equipped computer lab.

Support for “slow learners”?

Remedial classes, regular assignments and tests are conducted in selected chapters for slow learners. To improve the academic quality of slow learners, a new scheme called ‘Scholar Support Program’ has been introduced by the Collegiate

Education Department which functions efficiently in our college. Activities given below are conducted for slow learners:

- Remedial classes & Tutorials are organized for such slow learners.
- Simplified versions of books are recommended to them.
- Special tests, Trial tests and mock examinations are conducted for them.
- Bilingual explanations and discussions.
- Revision of topics and practical.
- Their daily homework is checked to monitor their progress
- They are guided to take coaching from specialists in the field
- Concept clarification and problem solving exercises and provision of simple but standard lecture notes/course materials are also given.
- Personal, academic and social counseling.

Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning/ corporate/business house etc.?

Industrial tours or on the spot study constitute the part of the curriculum as well as evaluation process in many departments. To gain more knowledge in their discipline, local field trips are arranged. The trips to research laboratories and academic institutions of repute enable them to make informed choices regarding career and higher studies. The college upholds democratic values and ensures representation of all stake holders in the day to day activities. Student representation is given in most of the bodies including the discipline committee, Anti Ragging Cell and the advisory committee of the NSS and NCC. Career oriented workshops with corporate/business houses are given by the career counseling cell. Students are encouraged to participate and present papers in seminars and conferences organized by other institutions.

Publication of student magazines?

The charge of guiding and supporting the students in publishing college magazine is given to a faculty member. College magazine published annually, thus it provide opportunities to students to express their literary skills. In each academic year, the Student Union publishes a volume of magazine. The editorial board includes:

- 1.Principal
- 2.Staff Editor: Nominated by the Principal
- 3.Two members of the teaching staff

4.Chief student Editor

5.Chairman of the college union

6.The Secretary of the college Union

7.Three members nominated from the students of the college by the chief student editor with the approval of the Principal.

Literary works suitable to publish in the college magazine are selected by the editorial board. An amount is collected from each student during the time of admission towards the college magazine. The PTA also provides the necessary financial aid. The departments are instructed to provide attendance to the students engaged in magazine work and special classes are to be arranged for them. The magazine consists of four sections: English, Malayalam, Hindi and Arabic. Contributions especially from the students in all the above languages in the form of articles, short stories, poems, etc. are accepted for publication. This annual publication provides opportunity for the students to express their creativity and innovative ideas. Different departments are publishing manuscripts and wall magazines.

5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts?

Necessary information and prospectors of entrepreneurship in various fields are provided by the Entrepreneurship Club. The industrial visits undertaken by the students of some departments like Economics, Commerce, Computer Science etc also help to inculcate the entrepreneurship skills among the students. College conducts entrepreneurial training for the students every year. To come out of stress and prosper in admitted course, institution in general and departments in particular are instrumental in organizing special counselling programs and remedial classes. All the teaching departments offer counseling to students through their interactions outside the class hours. The economically backward students are benefited by financial assistance from the Government in the form of scholarships. Various endowment prizes and merit awards instituted in the different departments offer the students a motivation to excel in their studies. UG and PG Courses in Commerce have been strengthened as per global trends/needs in International Business. Job training programs are often organized by the department of Commerce and career counseling cell.

Impact of these efforts: Our students have been employed in public and private sector. The skill enhancement opportunities provided by the college paved their way for higher education in prestigious institutions in India and abroad.

The Sports Wing, NSS Unit and Student Union of the college chalk out the policies and strategies to promote participation of students in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities. For showcasing the singing, dancing, aptitudes for debates, elocution, quiz and theatrical skills of the students, competitions like ‘Fresher’s Welcome’ (both central and departmental), Annual Social etc are held. For this purpose, the institution avails the services of the extremely talented faculty. College promotes extra-curricular and co-curricular activities of students through Sports club. The general captain charts out policies and strategies for various events. The placement cell organizes debates, elocution, quiz and theatrical presentations of the students.

The college regularly arranges various seminars, workshops, cultural programs, singing competitions, Essay competitions, etc., to promote participation of students in extracurricular activities. The NSS wing of the college is very active and regularly arrange external camps with several programs and *Shramadana* activities. In order to enable the students to prepare for competitive examinations as a part of their entry in Govt. and non-government services, the college has started conducting classes using the funds of UGC under the XIth and XIIth Plan schemes. More than 600 valuable books related to general studies and on competitive exams are purchased according to the need and requirements of the students and the syllabus. Individual departments support students in preparing for UGC-CSIR NET examinations by conducting orientation classes during the tutorial sessions. The college has a coaching center dedicated for training students for appearing in the UPSC and PSC Examination. Students are trained every year. Students are also assisted in appearing for the examinations like GATE. Interactions of students with meritorious alumni are also organized by the departments as motivational exercise.

5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)?

Counselling Service Cell for students is available in the college. The Institution has some trained personnel among the staff members. The Cell conducts career counselling sessions before the admission in the general degree curriculum. The importance of proficiency in communications, soft skills etc are imparted to students. They are then exposed to motivational lectures delivered by faculty members. Students are allowed to ask questions and clear their doubts once the presentation is over. Students are made aware of the details of the potential employer, job profile and system of short- listing plus selection, they will have to undergo.

- Remedial and Tutorial classes are taken to support the students.
- Seminar library facilities are available in all the academic departments.
- Encourage PG students to attend seminars, conferences and present papers.
- Career Counseling Cell and Gender Sensitization Cell provide student support services.
- On behalf of the institution, career counseling services are handled by Career Counseling Cell, with inputs from the Center of Entry in Services.

5.1.9 Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students? If 'yes', detail on the services provided to help students identify job opportunities and prepare themselves for interview and the percentage of students selected during campus interviews by different employers (list the employers and the programs)?

Yes. Career Guidance cell takes the responsibility of arranging campus selection and also to send students for other selections and also it arranges meetings and interactive sessions in order to strengthen the weak areas identified in the students like Spoken English and quantitative aptitude. A Career Counselling Cell exists in the college. It conducts classes for UGC funded Entry-in-services Coaching. Notices are given to the students to attend campus interview.

5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance redress cell? If yes, list (if any) the grievances reported and redressed during the last four years?

Yes. The college has a Grievance Redress Cell to redress the grievances of the stakeholders.

The Grievance Redressal Cell is constituted by the Teachers' Council with one senior teacher as the Convener and 5 faculty members have been representing the committee. Its major functions are:

- The cell/committee receives the cases of grievance of any sort in writing.
- The cell investigates the matter and sort out the problem in its meeting with concerned persons.
- The cases where administrative intervention is necessary are referred to the Principal with suggestive remedy.

The students can approach the cell for their grievances regarding academic matters, financial matters, library and other facilities in the campus. A Complaints and Suggestions box has been placed and students are free to write their grievances and put it in the box. Students are always encouraged to express their complaints and requirements freely. But no formal grievance/complaint is reported so far during the last five years. The reason may be that the students have free access to the Principal and Departmental Heads and are more comfortable to talk with the concerned administrative Heads. Principal always extend patient hearing towards students' complaints and immediately tries to resolve their problems.

5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

College council has constituted a Women's cell according to UGC guidelines. Cell functions in the college under the guidance of senior lady teachers, which has been formed to look into the matter of sexual harassment of women in the institution. The cell makes women students aware of the social responsibilities and gives them mental support to fight against sexual harassment of women students and for other women in the society. This cell takes initiatives for guidance and counseling of female students. But no grievance of this kind has been reported by any girl student in the last five years due to strict vigilance exercised by the authority on the college campus.

5.1.12 Is there an anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

Yes, there is an anti-ragging cell, though ragging is banned in the college. At the beginning of every academic session, freshers are made aware of the ragging related rules and regulations through counseling before admission; they are also made to sign an Anti-Ragging affidavit. The committee directs the respective departments and the students union to exercise the strict vigil on the students and to report immediately about any untoward incidents for appropriate action. Ragging related complaints can be deposited in the box kept in the college office. No instances of ragging have been reported during the last four years. The college has also exhibited two flex boards exposing the consequences of ragging in the campus.

5.1.13 Enumerate the welfare schemes made available to students by the institution?

The Institution has many Welfare Schemes for the students. Some schemes are purely Governmental and some are supported by the community. One of the faculty members has been appointed as the Student Welfare Officer to take care of their grievances and handle every situation that hinders their studies. We have a subsidized canteen with varieties of nutritious & delicious menu, and safe drinking water. The Institution informs the students about the scholarships and other financial assistance that are entitled to them during their course. Students are also advised regarding how to locate information about jobs and apply for them properly. Prominent among them are:

- Remedial teaching for slow learners.

- Career and counselling for all students.
- Training for various competitive examinations.
- Encouragement for participation in intra and inter-college debates sports etc.
- Promotion of performing art and cultural activities.
- Ensuring reservation during admission.
- Scholarships and frees ships for deserved categories of students.
- Travel concessions.
- Free UGC sponsored remedial coaching classes and coaching for competitive exams.
- Canteen with subsidized rate for students.
- Drinking water (Aqua guard facilities).
- Gymnasium and ground for sports activities.
- Common Room for girls.
- Gents and Ladies Lavatories for Students
- Vehicle parking facility for students
- Health and hygiene awareness campaign provided by college faculty.
- Free medical checkups in collaboration with various organizations.

5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment?

Career Guidance and Placement Cell function in the college and act as a centre for identifying job opportunities and higher education facilities. Students are informed of the higher education institutions and application procedures. Notification of admission to premier institutions is displayed on the notice board and students are encouraged to apply for admission. As a result, our students have begun to apply for admission to premier institutions such as Pondichery central University, Hyderabad central University, Madras University, Indian Institute of Mass communication, New Delhi, Central University Thanjore, Kerala University, University of Calicut, Malayalam University and MG University and we have succeeded in getting them admission in these centers.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

- Remedial Coaching Classes for SC/ST/OBC and Minorities (UGC Funded) have been instrumental in considerably reducing the dropout rate of our students and in raising their academic performance.
- Tutorial system and special classes are also arranged.
- The newly introduced scheme ‘Scholar Support Programme’ is implemented in the college with the funding of the Government of Kerala. Under this scheme, students who are weak in their respective subjects are identified and provided with special coaching.
- Students who had discontinued their studies owing to early marriage are welcomed to the institution in the ensuing semesters.
- Personalized counseling classes are given to avoid the problem of drop outs.

5.3 STUDENT PARTICIPATION AND ACTIVITIES

- **Sports and Games:**

The Student Union under the General Captain organizes the events. These activities are usually commenced from September of every year and completes by February. Around 25% of the students participate in the events.

INTRODUCTION

The institutional governance is made fully transparent and democratic adhering to principles made by the University, Government and UGC. The Principal, Staff Council, PTA, students Union and IQAC have been working with full co-operation for the welfare of the Campus. The administration is fully computerized. The Principal and staff council have been taking maximum care to incorporate suggestions given by IQAC for the development of the college. The staff club has been ensuring the coordination and emotional unity among its members.

6.1. INSTITUTIONAL VISION AND LEADERSHIP

6.1.1. State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.?

NMSM Govt. College is an academic fraternity of individuals committed to its vision; 'KINDLING THE MINDS'. The college strives to shape the student community, which is the cream of the society, into better citizens, and guides them to contribute constructively towards national priorities like creation of wealth and generation of employment. Imparting quality education through innovative techniques and practices and help to equip the socially and economically backward students to cope with the latest requirements.

To provide basic facilities for them to familiarize with new arenas of knowledge and to engage more deeply in studies and researches.

Ensuring the physical, mental and spiritual development of the students through curricular and co curricular activities.

To mould intelligent, healthy and talented youngsters, thus dedicate them for the country.

Realizing the fact, that kindling mind through education is the best way to uplift the rural and tribal youth; the college tries to give meaningful education to the students.

The vision and mission statements of NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta are formulated in line with the diverse needs of the society served by the institution. The college has made higher education accessible to the students from rural areas as well as the deprived lot. The college ensures that the vision and mission of the Institution is in tune with the higher education policies of the nation by introducing career-oriented courses, programs and activities, thereby offering the benefit of education to all. The college ensures economic, social and educational empowerment of under privileged sections of society. The college translates its vision to the surrounding society in a number of ways like imparting quality education, through NSS, NCC, ASAP, WWS, SSP, Women Cell etc, through extension programs, through various committees

functioning in the college and by fostering a vibrant atmosphere conducive to all round development of students.

6.1.2. What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The college council assists the Principal to act according to the decisions taken by the council and the Principal takes the message to the faculty. The faculty members of the college follow the advice given by the Principal and interact with him/her very frequently and exert their efforts for achieving the goals of the institution. The Principal leads a team of faculty members, along with other stakeholders in formulating policies and programmes. Various committees, cells and clubs such as Purchase committee, Examination Committee, research cell, career guidance cell etc are formulated with teachers as members. These committees discuss various matters within their purview and present their reports and recommendations to the Head of the Institution. The administrative staff is also entrusted with various responsibilities. The infrastructural and other requirements and their installations etc in various departments are monitored by the Principal and the college council.

6.1.3. What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring the policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission:

The institutional policies for achieving its goals are developed by the Principal, staff council, and respective clubs. The participation of the students are ensured by college union, co-ordinators and members of different clubs.

Formulation of action plan for all operation and incorporation of the same in to the institutional strategic plan.

IQAC, staff council and planning board are the three important decision making agencies in the institution. The purchase committee ensures that the transactions are happened as per the guidance prescribed by the UGC and state government.

Interaction with stakeholders

Teaching and non teaching staff, students and parents are the main stakeholders of the institution. Their fruitful interaction is ensured by frequent meeting of these bodies. Staff meeting in the initial part of the year democratically elects the stakeholders of different curricular and extracurricular bodies in the institution. Their function is constantly observed by the Principal. Regular meetings of these bodies assess and encourage the functioning of these groups

Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders.

The recommendations of the meetings of various stakeholders are submitted to the staff council through the Principal and the positive suggestions are incorporated into the policy.

Reinforcing the culture of excellence

The institution is keen in promoting the culture of excellence among its faculty, non-teaching staff and students. As a means to achieve this goal, they are constantly encouraged to participate in external seminars, workshops, training programs and so on.

Champion organizational change

The Principal constitutes appropriate organizational changes to ensure the wellbeing of the institution. For example, the current Principal has ensured a more SSR- NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta

fruitful interaction between the tutors and Discipline Committee to ensure the physical and moral discipline of the campus.

6.1.4. What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The college has a clear and well-defined system to ensure effective implementation of the policies and plans of the institution. IQAC conducts a self-evaluative exercise for all the departments to identify the strengths and weaknesses of functioning of the college in various areas. Feedbacks on various aspects of the functioning of the college are obtained from different stakeholders to evaluate the efficacy of policy decisions. Frequent meetings of the college Council also helps to evaluate the programs of the institution and the progress on utilizing the UGC Fund and State Government Plan Fund .

The manager of the college is the Director of Collegiate Education, Government of Kerala and is duly represented by the Principal who is in charge of academic and administrative affairs in the college. For empowering the faculty members, the top management provides a number of distinctive training programs based on their stage in career progression. Faculty members are encouraged to carry out minor and major research projects of various agencies. The Principal constantly deposes faculty members for various seminars /conferences at the national/international level to enable the faculty to update their knowledge base and be exposed to the recent trends in higher education.

The faculty members are encouraged to develop as academic leaders and researchers. Workshops and training programs are conducted for the career and personal growth and development of the staff members. The non-teaching staff is relieved to take part in leadership programs offered by the Institute of Management in Government (IMG) and other staff development programs in and outside the institution. Students' leadership is groomed through the Students' Council, Department Associations, NCC, NSS, etc. Students are nominated to the IQAC as well. The office-bearers of the Students' Council discuss and deliberate on student problems on the campus and suggest solutions to problems. Students are encouraged to participate in sports, arts and other fields. Activities and programs of the NCC and NSS aim at developing the leadership qualities of the students. Programs like ASAP, WWS etc and the clubs and forums functioning in the college too help the students in optimizing their leadership potential.

The college ensures decentralized governance by delegating authority and providing autonomy to all the units of the institution. The college Council headed by the Principal with the support of HODs and various committees play a pivotal role in decision-making. The HODs undertake work allocation, monitoring and evaluation. The college gives sanction to the Academic Departments to implement programs with a view to bring about quality and the Heads of the Departments are encouraged to discuss academic and administrative matters with the Principal. Work distribution, evaluation, formulation of remedial measures etc are performed within the

departments. The Student's Council, in consultation with the Staff Advisor undertakes the responsibility of organizing co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

Yes, NMSM Government College promotes participative management. The IQAC is constituted as per the norms of the UGC. This ensures the involvement of teaching and non-teaching staff, students and the management in the decision making process. Members of the non-teaching staff and students are included in different working committees along with the faculty members. The teaching and non-teaching staff members also have associations of their own. During their meetings, issues are discussed and opinions are sought on matters regarding them. The college Union is formed in accordance with the rules and regulations laid by the affiliating university. College Principal is the ex-officio President of the Union while the Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Joint Secretary, Chief Student Editor, Fine Arts Secretary, General Captain, University Union Councilor, Class representatives and Association secretaries are elected from among the students. One of the faculty members serves as the Staff Advisor to the college Union.

6.2 STRATEGY DEVELOPMENT AND DEPLOYMENT



For promoting quality of research, faculty members are encouraged to carry out minor and major research projects of various agencies. They are permitted to attend and present papers in seminars, conferences, symposia and workshops. Research journals, both peer reviewed and general, are subscribed for the use of researchers. Students are also trained to conduct research as part of their UG and PG curriculum. The college actively intervenes in the sphere of community development too through various activities of the NSS, NCC and other forums.

The institution has a perspective plan for academic as well as non-academic development. The IQAC prepares a perspective plan which is formally recorded in the AQAR and submitted to the NAAC annually. The college infrastructure is improved on a timely basis and whenever land development and modification or constructions of buildings are involved, the designs and estimates are prepared by the PWD of the state government. The major infrastructural developments include upgradation of computer science lab, construction of new administrative block, auditorium and a new ladies hostel.

The Principal is the head of the institution. All the staff, both teaching and non-teaching are under his/her direct control. Administrative and financial powers are delegated to him/her by the Director of Collegiate Education for ensuring effective and smooth functioning of the institution. On the academic side, there is a Vice-Principal for assisting the Principal. In the absence of the Principal, the Vice-Principal discharges the duties of the Principal. There is a head of department for each faculty. The heads of departments prepare the plan for various academic activities of the respective departments in consultation with the faculty members, with the approval of the Principal. The Staff Council of the college advice the Principal in all academic and

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administrative matters. The administrative section consisting of a Senior Superintendent, Head Accountant, Clerks and Typist assist the Principal in matters related to the administration of the institution. Internal and external correspondence, service matters of staff, accounts, admission and examination work are carried out by the administrative wing. Various committees monitor and execute the plans and programs of the college. The college PTA plays an important role in decisions relating to the infrastructures and general functioning of the college. Clubs and associations are formed for conducting extra-curricular activities of the students and various committees ensure the overall discipline of the college.

6.2.4. Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following:

Teaching & Learning

Effective and efficient transaction of teaching and learning is ensured in this institution as highly qualified and competent teaching faculty are being recruited by the Kerala Public Service Commission. Provisions are also made for the professional development of faculty by providing support to undergo refresher courses, to equip them with modern pedagogical tools, encouraging them to attend and organize International/ National/ State/ Regional Seminars etc. The Departments enhance the quality of teaching and learning techniques through interactive boards, LCDs and Projectors. Tutorial system and mentoring are also resorted to. PG students are encouraged to participate in seminars and also to undertake peer teaching sessions.

Research & Development

The college has established a Research Cell to promote research aptitude among the faculty and the students. Faculties are encouraged to do research and avail FIP/FDP. For promoting quality of research, faculty members are encouraged to carry out minor and major research projects of various agencies. They are permitted to attend and present papers in seminars, conferences, symposia and workshops. Research journals, both peer reviewed and general, are subscribed for the use of researchers. SSR- NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta

Students are also trained to conduct research as part of their UG and PG curriculum. The college research committee has been publishing a research journal called '*Explorations*', by including the articles of the faculty from various departments. The presentations in a national seminar conducted by the department of Malayalam have been collected and published by the research committee with the title '*Sooruma*'. The committee has also published the writings of Prof. P C Ramankutty, a retired faculty of the college with the title '*Ezhuthukrishi*'

Community Engagement

The NSS unit of the college has been carrying out remarkable works in the field of community development like undertaking continuing support programs for tribal colonies and settlements; construction and maintenance of roads, conducts Socio Economic Health Survey, Blood and Organ Donation Campaign etc. We also have association with the Pain and Palliative Units of the region in which our students serve as volunteers.

Human Resource Management

The teaching faculty and the other staff members are recruited by the Kerala Public Service Commission as per the norms stipulated by the UGC and the Government of Kerala. The faculty members are assigned to duties other than teaching based on their qualifications and experience. They are made co-coordinators of the various academic and non-academic activities to aid the quality improvement of the institution.

Industry Interaction

Various departments in the college takes creative steps to empower our students with exposure to the industry concerned and also bridge the gap between industry and the academy. The Department of Commerce frequently organizes field trips and industrial visits to industrial parks, factories and corporate offices to acquaint the students with emerging best practices in the industry. The department of Commerce also organizes Budget Review program, conferences etc in association with Chambers SSR- NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta

of Commerce and corporate. The Entrepreneurship Club of the college in association with Department of Commerce organizes a number of industrial interactions like ‘Meet Successful Entrepreneurs’ in which noted entrepreneurs from state and outside are invited for interacting with the students. The Department of Mass Communication organizes frequent visits to the bureaus of visual, digital and print media as a part of their curriculum to familiarise the students with the contemporary trends in media, production, distribution and management. ‘Walk With a Scholar’, a new initiative of Government of Kerala has also been making industrial visits to boost the confidence of the students.

6.2.5. How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts, etc.) is available for the top management and the stake holders, to review the activities of the institution?

The Principal ensures the availability of information by holding periodical meetings with stake holders to review the overall progress of the institution. Such interactions include personal interactions with students at both formal and informal level and interaction with the faculty and non-teaching staff. During periodic interface with the Principal and the Director of Collegiate Education, discussion is conducted and corrective actions are taken. The college council meeting and interface between the HODs and the Principal ensures a platform for future action and improvement. The PTA executive meeting, Class PTA meeting and Annual PTA meetings are also used to discuss such matters. Presentation of a consolidated report by the Principal on the college Day also provides the stakeholders with significant information relating to the functioning of the college.

6.2.6. How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

All the faculty members are given the role of either co-coordinators or members of various committees, clubs and units. During staff meetings, faculty members are

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encouraged to propose views and ideas for improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional process. The Staff Club arranges farewell functions, picnic, family tour, felicitation of staff achievements, etc. The class tutor system, 'Walk With A Scholar Scheme, Scholar Support Program etc facilitate creative involvement of the faculty.

6.2.8. Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

University of Calicut has taken a favorable stand in the policy of awarding the status of autonomy to affiliated institutions. At present the institution's facilities stand short of fulfilling the criteria needed for applying for the status as an autonomous institution. SSR- NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta

The institution has a grievance redressal mechanism to address and redress the grievances of the students, teaching and non-teaching staff. The Principal ensures a prompt and effective disposal of the grievances of various stakeholders including parents. General complaints of routine nature are first brought to the notice of the tutor and the concerned head of the Department. If the complaint is not redressed at that level, the complainant can approach the Principal for better solution. If the problems are not resolved there, the Principal will place it in the college Staff Council and find ways for a solution.

6.2.10. *During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?*

There had not been any court cases by and against the institution.

6.2.11. *Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feed-back on institutional performance? If ‘yes,’ what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?*

The institution has its own mechanism for obtaining feedback from the students in order to improve the performance and quality of the institutional processes. The feedback thus obtained is discussed and analyzed. Some of the outcomes of the analysis of such a feedback include the improvement of lavatory facilities, shifting of health and fitness centre, entrusting the college canteen to the college co-operative society etc.

6.3 FACULTY EMPOWERMENT STRATEGIES

6.3.1. What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

The professional development activities undertaken by the college helps to acquire and improve various skills required for both teaching and non teaching staff members. The college ensures the professional development of the staff by organizing programs that cater to the professional, career and personal development of the staff members. The institution encourages staff members to enroll for training programs and workshops. Seminars and workshops on different subjects are conducted at the institutional level and staff members are encouraged to attend seminars, conferences and workshops conducted by other institutions in state and national level. Faculty members are also permitted to attend refresher courses/ orientation courses on their request. Faculty members are encouraged to take up minor and major research projects offered by the UGC and other academic and professional bodies. They are also encouraged to avail FDP of UGC, to provide consultation services, serve as resource persons and to take up responsibilities in academic bodies.

6.3.2. What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The IQAC of the college has been imparting training through workshops and seminars in various fields like use of I.T resources, teaching learning resources etc. The institution encourages staff members to enroll for training programs like FLAIR, workshops, refresher courses, orientation courses etc. The co-ordinators of NCC and SSR- NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta

NSS participate in training programs as per government norms. Diverse programs arranged by the Staff Club of the college like family get-togethers, Tours, etc. to motivate the staff and contribute towards the better functioning of the institution.

6.3.3. Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The appraisal system in the college relies much on student feedback. Students are asked to evaluate teachers with the help of a printed feedback form during each academic year. Every teacher is asked to keep his/her appraisal form and the procedure is monitored by IQAC

6.3.4. What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken are communicated to the appropriate stakeholders in order to increase accountability. The faculties are made aware of their strengths, weakness, opportunities and challenges. The staff meetings, department meetings, PTA meetings etc also facilitate communicating the strategies with the respective stakeholders.

6.3.5. What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

Being a government institution, the college depends mainly on the welfare schemes provided by state and central government and the UGC. Major welfare measures made available by such bodies include Group Insurance, State Life SSR- NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta

Insurance, General Provident Fund, Vehicle Loan, Housing Loan, Festival Allowance/ Advance, Retirement Benefits, etc. Maternity Leave, Paternity leave, Leave for Study Purpose, Medical Re-imburement, and Special Casual Leave etc can also be availed by the staff members. In addition to these, the PTA of the college provides financial advance to ad hoc staff members and to co-ordinators of various clubs and forums.

6.3.6. What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The appointment and transfer of staff is done by the State Public Service Commission and the state government respectively and as such the college does not have much role in this regard. However, physical and other facilities in the college and its unique geographical location attract staff members to a certain extent. The college council accords fair treatment to both permanent and ad hoc staff members in terms of sharing of administrative responsibilities, and representation in committees. The faculties are provided with well-furnished departments and free internet access and are given chances to participate in quality improvement programs.

6.4 FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT AND **RESOURCE MOBILIZATION**

6.4.1. What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The finance and accounting section headed by the Head Accountant under the supervision of the Senior Superintendent and the administrative control of the Principal effectively discharges the functions relating to the management of financial resources. These functions are performed in accordance with the rules, regulations and financial

policies framed by the respective authorities. All the formalities are duly completed and proper records are maintained for every purchase. A tender/quotation system is followed for the purchase of items. Each and every transaction is supported by vouchers. As and when the utilization of funds received under a scheme is over, it is audited by a Chartered Accountant and sent to the respective funding authorities. The Principal often review financial resources regularly to ensure their optimum usage and reports the status of the utilization of funds to the Director of Collegiate Education during conferences. The Accounts and Audit section of the Collegiate Education Department and the Accountant General's office also audit the funds utilized by the institution.

6.4.2. *What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.*

The finance and accounting operations of the college are regularly audited by the auditors deputed by the Director of Collegiate Education and the Accountant General. The accounts of NSS, PTA etc are audited separately. The Staff Fund collected by the staff club is audited every year by an internal auditor appointed in the staff club meeting. No major irregularities have been noted in the AG Audit. The last such audit was undertaken from 04/01/2015 to 06/01/2015.

6.4.3. *What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.*

The major sources of institutional receipts are the Grants from the State Government and UGC. Other sources of institutional receipts/funding of the college include:

- Various grants and financial aids received from the UGC.
- SSR- NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta

- Contributions by MLAs/MPs from various developmental funds.
- Conference grants received from the UGC, the Kerala State Higher Education Council ,Directorate of Collegiate Education etc
- Contributions made by the Alumni.
- PTA Fund
- College Development funds.

Deficit, if any, is borne by securing additional financial help and support from authorities and local community.

6.4.4. Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The college employs various methods to mobilize the resources needed for its effective functioning. Other than the Plan grants, the institution is securing additional funding from the PTA, CDC, donations from alumni and other well-wishers. The expenditure for the conduct of seminars and conferences is met by the grants received from the UGC and the Director of Collegiate Education. The college has also applied for and has been sanctioned grants under the various schemes of the UGC.

6.5 INTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE SYSTEM (IQAS)

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has been established in the college for ensuring quality enhancement on a continuous basis. The college Council is the apex body which takes major decisions regarding the institution while the IQAC tends to be SSR- NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta

a supervisory body. IQAC captures the efforts and measures of the institution for achieving academic excellence. IQAC takes initiative in research and developmental activities, leads quality assessment, manage feedback and appraisal system etc. Being a government college, we have to follow the quality policy formulated by the state and central governments. The college is managed by the Directorate of Collegiate Education under the Department of Higher Education and as such the functions of the college are shaped by the policies of the State Higher Education Council. The IQAC is constituted as per the guidelines issued by NAAC from time to time. The staffs, students, parents and all other stake holders strive hard to promote quality education in our institution. Staff members are encouraged to participate in training and development programs conducted by the UGC-ASCs and other bodies. College level seminars, conferences and workshops are also organized for empowering the staff as well as the students.

b) How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management/authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

The college council always follows the recommendations of IQAC and gives high priority towards it. Whenever decisions are to be taken by higher authorities, the proposals are forwarded through the proper channel.

c) Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contributions made by them.

The following are the external members in IQAC:

1. Adv. Sadhique Neelikandy
2. Prof. V.T. Poulouse

Adv. Sadhique hails from the Neelikandy family who contributed 25 acres of land for starting the college and Prof. Poulouse is a former Principal in Charge of the college. Their long term acquaintance with the college and expertise in the respective fields are of immense help to the IQAC in devising suitable strategies.

d) How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC of the institution?

SSR- NMSM Govt. College, Kalpetta

To represent the student community in the affairs of the institution, two student representatives are included in the IQAC. The alumni effectively support the IQAC in augmenting the infrastructure and other facilities of the college. The opinion of both students and alumni are given due consideration while framing various decisions.

e) How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The IQAC has representatives of the teaching and the non-teaching staff, students and alumni. Decisions taken by the IQAC are discussed in the college Council meeting and such matters are then conveyed to the staff members. Proper notices, e-mails and messages through social media platforms are also used. While forming committees and forums, utmost care is taken to ensure fair representation of staff from different constituents of the institution.

6.5.2. Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalization.

The Principal assigns the duties and responsibilities to faculty as per their tastes and aptitude. Similar to that, the Senior Superintendent of the college distributes duties among the office staff for ensuring quality in administrative activities. The IQAC motivates monitors, sustains and also enhances the quality and performance of the faculty and the administrative staff.

6.5.3. Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

The college offers training to the staff members to ensure quality service. The IQAC have hosted workshops in the areas like using smart boards, research proposal preparation etc.

6.5.4. Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

The teachers' diary maintained by every teacher helps in assessing syllabus progression and completion. It is verified by the respective H.O.Ds as well as the Principal. During the department meetings, classes and subjects are allotted to teachers and the completion of syllabus is also reviewed. The HODs verify and ensure that proper conduct and valuation of assignments, seminars, internal assessment etc. are done in the respective department. Internal arrangements are also made for conducting special classes.

6.5.5. How is the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/ regulatory authorities?

The IQAC submits yearly AQAR to the NAAC. This helps the institution to assess its strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats every year, and to correct the shortcomings at the right time. The internal quality assurance mechanisms of the institution are formulated as per the guidelines of the external quality assurance agencies like the NAAC, the Kerala State Higher Education Council, the Directorate of Collegiate Education and the affiliated university.

6.5.6. What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The IQAC collects feedback from students for reviewing the quality of teaching-learning process. The teachers' diary maintained by every teacher helps in assessing the progress of the process. It is verified by the respective H.O.Ds as well as the Principal. On the basis of feedback collected and processed, improvement is made

in the process of teaching by giving training to faculty. Scholar Support Program (SSP), Additional Skill Acquisition Program (ASAP), Walk With a Scholar (WWS) etc implemented in the college also helps in enhancing the quality of teaching learning process.

6.5.7. How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

Periodic meetings of the staff members are convened by the IQAC to communicate quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes. IQAC makes use of modern means like e-mail, social media platforms etc to communicate the same to various stakeholders. Quality assurance policies are communicated to parents through PTA executive meetings, Class PTAs and General PTA meetings. Meetings of College Development Committee, alumni etc also provide platforms to the IQAC in communicating the same. Proper reporting is also made to the University and the management. Meetings of stakeholders, seminars, alumnae meet, college magazine, handbook, college website etc., are the other modes of communication.

CRITERION VII

INNOVATION AND BEST PRACTICES

INTRODUCTION

NMSM Govt. College is located in primeval natural setting, at high altitude, a large variety of representatives from the world of flora and fauna and a very calm and serene atmosphere to conduct the academic and extracurricular activities. The institution has been taking special care to maintain the biodiversity of the campus to keep the atmosphere neat and clean. The key areas of focus have been: (1) ensure cleanliness of the campus through systematic management of wastes (2) planting of trees to ensure natural serenity (3) enquiries on alternative sources of energy and maximum use of renewable resources. Among the relevant academic practices Box of Success and Campus Radio are note worthy for their creativity and difference in stimulating the learning process.

7.1 ENVIORNMENT CONSCIOUSNESS

The college situates in Wayanad which has been a continuous spot of attraction and joy for tourists. Wayanad is noted for some extra ordinary natural settings such as Edakkal Caves (famous for its ancient rock paintings), Meenmutty water fall, Banasura Sagar (the largest earth dam in India), Chembra (the second highest peak in the Western Ghats), Pakshi Pathalam (a sanctuary for rare birds), the beautiful Kuruva Island and Muthanga wild life sanctuary with wide variety of animals and birds. The tribals who have been the original inhabitants of the district made special attention for the nurturing and maintenance of the evergreen forests as it supplied the recourses for their survival. The ecological structure of the district was seriously amended after the introduction of the plantations by the British and large number of migrants from Travancore and Malabar. Recently, the national government itself has recognized the importance of sustaining the environmental purity, biodiversity and natural serinity of Wayanad as a global need. Tourism has been gaining momentum in Wayanad after the

introduction of a large number of tourist spots such as Karlad Lake, Banasura Sagar dam, Karapuzha dam, romantic Kuruva Island, the ever green Pookode Lake and so on.

The institution is located between Chundale and Kalpetta in 25 acres of land at Vellaramkunnu surrounded by coffee plantation and forest lands .We have been taking maximum efforts to upgrade and protect the ecological balance of the campus. Very recently Wayanad has been recognized as the Ninth best natural location in the world by *Trivago .com*, a renowned tourist website. It is also significant that the landscape is a part of Nilgiri bio reserve noted for its beautiful climate and a host of perfect visual treats.

7.1.1 Does the institute conduct a green audit of its campus facilities?

The nature club of NSS and the Green army in the campus have been conducting green audit periodically. The assistance of Department of Social Forestry has been sought to ensure successful culmination of the project.

7.1.2

a). Energy conservation/ use of renewable energy

As a part of exploring alternative sources of energy, a bio gas plant is constructed in the campus with a view to ensure the use of its fuel for cooking in the canteen .Three solar lamps are installed in focal points of the campus to ensure the maximum use of solar energy. Pits are dug in various parts of the campus to harvest water during the rainy season .The trees, plants and marshland in the campus are capable of absorbing huge amount of water for future use .A check dam is constructed in the marshy part of the campus to preserve the maximum water. 7 acres of marshland is protected without any construction or structural transformation for ensuring maximum water harvesting.

b). Efforts for the Carbon Nutrality

In order to reduce carbon dioxide emission, trees have been planted on each environmental day by the students and staff. The green army of the campus in association with department of social forestry has been maintaining a ‘Star Forest’ with the same motive. Our campus is fully plastic free .The public transportation facilities are

encouraged to reduce vehicular pollution. Wastes are deposited in dust bins placed in different parts of the campus .They are systematically collected and removed.

c). Plantation

As plants are the gateways to environmental purity, the campus has been giving high priority for planting maximum number of trees through different initiatives. On each environmental day the nature club of NSS has been taking initiatives to plant trees by students and staffs. The Green Army of the campus has planted a Star Forest in association with the Department of Social Forestry. The trees pertaining to 27 stars in the Zodiac are kept in the mission. One acre of the campus is kept as Biodiversity Park. The student union has been experimenting with organic farming in the campus .The Alumni of the campus has initiated a bamboo planting project as a method of campus fencing. A rock garden is under construction in the campus.

d). Hazardous Waste Management/ E-Waste Management

To keep the campus neat and clean high priority is given for systematic waste management .The campus is fully plastic free. Dust bin are placed in appropriate locations and the waste is properly managed .The bio degradable waste is used in biogas plant to produce cooking gas. E-waste is considerably reduced via maximum use of electronic equipment through repairing when it is needed.

7.2 INNOVATIONS

The academic atmosphere of the campus has been considerably increased through a host of initiatives under various schemes during the last five years. Some of the achievements are given below.

1. All the class rooms are equipped with interactive white boards
2. A high speed broadband Wi-Fi internet connectivity is available throughout the campus.
3. INFLIBNET facility has enhanced the research aptitude of the faculty and the students.
4. A collection of e-journals are available in the library through DELNET.
5. Large number of research papers are downloaded from the Shodganga and are kept in the library and in the general lab.
6. Three ramps are constructed at different parts of the building to ensure the smooth passage of differently abled persons.
7. The college is equipped with a well established public addressing system.
8. A lot of Books, journals and study material are purchased under the entry in service scheme.
9. National and regional seminars are regularly conducted by the major /minor departments.
10. The college auditorium *Sarangy* with a seating capacity of 500 is inaugurated
11. A well equipped Digital Theatre with advanced audio visual aids is constructed.
12. A gymnasium is constructed with enough equipments, sufficient ventilation and space for multiple activities.
13. The college NCC and NSS have been performing in remarkable manner.
14. The college magazine for the year 2012-13 *Mangandiku Koottupokumo* Has been awarded for the best college magazine by *Malayala Manorama* .

15. A ladies hostel is in the final stage of construction.
16. The reading space of the library is increased.
17. A playground with 400 meter track is in the finish.
18. The college has been conducting 4/5 course lecture series by bringing external experts in different disciplines and giving students a precious chance to interact with academicians.
19. The publication committee of the campus has published a journal called *Explorations*, a multi lingual multi disciplinary journal containing the articles of the faculty.
20. The activities of each year is published through a news letter called *Little Narratives*
21. The women cell of the campus has been advocating gender justice in the campus through a wide variety of programs.
22. The Department of Commerce has been conducting periodic management fest to improve entrepreneurial and administrative skill of the students.



3. POST ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES

The National Assessment and Accreditation Council visited our college on 17th to 19th December of 2008. The College was accredited with CGPA of 1.98 on four point scale at 'C' grade on 29-01-2009 and the accreditation granted is valid up to 28-01-2014. AS per the recommendation in the peer team report, an Internal Quality Assurance Cell was formed in the college on 18-02-2009. The peer team had made following observations in the report.

- New Programs in Science and Social Sciences may be initiated
- Introduction of appropriate Add on Courses to the local community needs
- Language laboratory to be established for the benefit of students.
- Career counseling and student mentoring may be initiated
- Hostel facilities for men and women students may be provided.
- Transport facilities to be augmented.
- Teachers to be encouraged strongly to take up Research work
- Computerization of administration
- Resource mobilization to be initiated making use of philanthropic organization and local community and alumni.
- Collaborative linkages with institution, industries and local bodies may be promoted.

The College has been striving to reform the academic environment, infrastructural facilities and other relevant areas keeping in view the recommendations of peer team report. The major activities are listed below.

CRITERION 1

- The introduction of choice based credit semester system has provided an inclusive academic frame work for the students.
- As a result of sustaining effort from the institution a new U.G Program has been introduced in Computer Science since 2012.
- Open course in semester system has offered inter-disciplinary learning option for the students.
- The modern academic tools such as projects, assignment, seminars and peer teaching have strengthened the academic commitment of the students.
- Some of the disciplines have increased their student strength through marginal increase.
- The Department of Commerce has conducted an add –on course in tally

CRITERION II

- The admission procedure has been streamlined through single window system
- Key focus is given in academic and extracurricular activities for the issues related to gender justice, environment, and marginalization and so on.
- Advanced academic facilities such as interactive white boards, EDUSAT, High speed broadband connectivity, and so on have been introduced.
- Number of permanent faculty has considerably increased.
- All the major and minor departments have conducted workshops and seminars to improve the academic quality
- Creative devices such as campus radio have been developed to stimulate learning process
- Greater prominence has been given to the career orientation of the students through in entry in service coaching programme, Campus interview, NET coaching, PSC coaching and so on.
- A large number of books have been purchased under this scheme
- Through the initiatives such as Box of Success, GK Club and so on the students are able to update their knowledge of general awareness and current affairs.
- The weaker learners are uplifted through remedial coaching, minority coaching, scholar support programme etc.
- Model examinations are conducted at the end of each semester to prepare students for the University examinations.
- A multi dimensional language lab is arranged to cater for the linguistic needs of the students.

- There is considerable increase in the research activities of the campus.
- A research committee and publication committee have been constituted to supervise and motivate such activities in the campus
- Four of the teaching faculty are PhD holders and ten are pursuing doctoral studies.

- Mrs. Priya P, Assistant professor of History Department is given the Award for the best paper in the modern section of the National Historical Congress 2013.
- The NSS unit of the college has adopted a tribal colony
- The students have also been active in pain and palliative programmes.

- A ladies hostel is expected to be inaugurated soon.
- The college auditorium Sarangi with a seating capacity of 500 is inaugurated.
- The library is enriched with INFLIBNET and DELNET

- A new block is constructed with Laboratory facilities and EDUSAT room for the computer science students.
- A Play ground is under construction with the facilities for outdoor games and a four hundred meter track.
- A well equipped gymnasium is established for improving the physical and mental health of the students.
- An additional ladies waiting room is furnished

- Students have been achieving a large no.of prizes in several zonal, regional and national competitions.



I am directed to convey the approval of the UGC to N.M.S.M. GOVERNMENT COLLEGE, KALPETTA, WAYANAD, KERALA, the XIIth plan allocation under the "General Development Assistance" (GDA) for the development of undergraduate and postgraduate education. The UGC in the XIIth plan has decided to provide grants under General Developmental Assistance as 'Block Grant'. The college will have the flexibility to incur expenditure as per the needs of the college. Accordingly, grant allocated under GDA to the college is under two object heads viz. Grant-in-aid General(31) and Capital Assets (35).

- The aforementioned allocation is for the development of undergraduate and postgraduate education. The amount released may be utilised within the allocated amount under Grant-in-aid General (31) and Capital Assets (35) as conveyed vide letter no. 3-1(066)/2012(UG)(XII PLAN)/KLCA066/SWRO dated 21-Mar-2014. Re-appropriation of funds between Grant-in-aid General (31) and Capital (35) is not permissible.
- The heads under which college can incur expenditure include Books and Journals, Equipment, Instrumentation facilities, Construction/Extension/Renovation of building, improvement of existing premises, competence building initiatives in colleges, Educational innovation, Field Work/Study Tours, Extension Activities, ICT in education, Common room and toilet for women, Day Care Centre, Human Rights and Duties Education and, Career and Counseling Cell.
- The college has to constitute a Planning Board with Principal as Chairman and Heads of departments, IQAC Coordinator, Librarian Bursor/Senior person from the Accounts department, as members.
- The Planning Board will finalise allocation to Undergraduate and Postgraduate departments after identifying the heads and deciding on priorities of departments.
- The eligibility criteria for Undergraduate and Postgraduate departments to get assistance under the scheme is given in the XIIth plan guidelines for General Development Assistance Grant to Colleges. The Planning Board may refer to the guidelines before finalizing allocation to Undergraduate and Postgraduate departments.
- Expenditure on construction/extension/renovation of building should not exceed 50% of the total grant under GDA. The college must inform the requirement of funds or otherwise for construction/extension/ renovation of building to UGC-SWRO, as per the procedure given in the XIIth Plan guidelines for the scheme of Development Assistance to colleges for the construction of buildings during the XIIth Plan to enable release of first installment grant for construction/extension/renovation purpose.
- After finalizing the budget allocation for Undergraduate and Postgraduate education, the Planning Board should submit the details as per Annexure-I and Annexure-II in the XIIth Plan guidelines alongwith building committee resolutions, in case funds required for Construction/Extension/Renovation, to the UGC, SWRO, Bangalore, on or before 31st June, 2014.






