15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Following the University of Calicut's curriculum, each program includes common courses, core courses, complementary courses, and open courses. The common courses encompass English language, Hindi, Arabic, and Malayalam. The college offers multidisciplinary courses in various programs. For instance, Undergraduate audit courses cover subjects like environmental studies, Disaster Management, Human Rights, and Gender Studies, emphasizing multidisciplinary perspectives. In the fifth semester, students from different disciplines can take a 2-credit open course to promote multidisciplinarity. open courses aim to encourage multidisciplinarity by allowing students from various backgrounds to explore subjects outside their main field of study. To further encourage multidisciplinary learning, the PG Departments of Economics and Journalism collaborate on an add-on course in Economic Journalism. The B.A. The Mass Communication program provides a diverse range of courses, including communication, media, advertising, film studies, Public Relations, and Corporate Communication, offering students a wide array of higher education and career opportunities. Additionally, courses in environmental economics and environmental chemistry are available through the Economics and Chemistry departments. These courses likely cover the economic and scientific aspects of environmental issues, demonstrating another example of multidisciplinary education. The Political Science Department provides courses in the History and Mass Communication departments.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The Kerala government is in the process of aligning with the NEP 2020 guidelines, and thus, the implementation of the Academic Bank of Credits system in the state is pending.

17.Skill development:

The college is committed to refining the skills and craftsmanship of its students. The Entrepreneurship Development (ED) club ignites

entrepreneurship in students and hosts a range of programs aimed at enhancing students' skills and fostering entrepreneurial abilities. The E-ooru Readers Forum enhances the reading, writing, and presentation skills of both students and faculty, including nonteaching staff. This is achieved through a variety of programs such as book talks, reviews, and critical write-ups. The Communication Club organizes a range of competitions in poster design, videography, and photography, providing students with a platform to display their skills and talents. The English department provides courses for the development of soft skills. Additionally, the Physical Education department has established a gymnasium for students to enhance their physical abilities. The college arts festival and sports events provide platforms for students to showcase their skills and talents every year. The Career Guidance Cell of the college assesses students' skills and interests, providing guidance accordingly. Ecothought, an initiative of the PG Department of Economics provides a platform for discussion on economics of everyday life.

1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

NMSM Government College, Kalpetta is located in Wayanad, the district with the largest tribal population in Kerala. Efforts toward curriculum enrichment and effective curriculum delivery have always been a priority of the institution. The library has been automated by installing KOHA software. Academic seminars and

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workshops are regularly conducted with the assistance of the UGC/ State Government and duly supported by IQAC. Owing to the pandemic situation, classroom transactions have been shifted to online platforms. Each teacher is instructed to submit a daily report of their classroom activities through a google form. Through Online Education Support Centre, a joint venture of alumni, staff, and PTA to provide e-gadgets to economically weak students, smartphones were issued to those who weredeserving. Feedback is collected from students and analyzed properly; effective remedial actions are taken without delay. Every year in the month of June, the Principal convenes a staff meeting and drafts a comprehensive action plan in consultation with all staff members. Timely interventions of the IQAC in matters regarding academic activities and co-curricular activities enhance the quality of the teaching-learning process.

1.1.2 - The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

The college is affiliated with Calicut University and hence the system mandated by the University is followed by the college. The University releases its academic calendar for both the odd and even semesters at the beginning of each academic year to ensure that the students get ninety working days in each semester. In other words, this means that there ought to be five hundred and forty classroom hours in one semester. 2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Efforts toward curriculum enrichment and effective curriculum delivery have always been a priority with a significant number of journals and periodicals. The library has been automated by installing KOHA software. Academic seminars and workshops are regularly conducted. However, the prolonged lockdown consequent of the pandemic, forced the institution to curtail many such activities indefinitely. The college calendar is in tune with the one provided by University and the same is executed through the master timetable and departmental timetables. Continuous evaluation is regularly monitored. Feedback is collected from students, parents, teachers, alumni etc. and analyzed systematically. Additional scaffolding for slow learners is regularly done in the form of remedial classes to enable students to face University exams with confidence. Career Development Club organized a Civil Service Orientation session to motivate civil service aspirants. All departments host career programs to help students have a clarity about the job market. Result analysis is done during department meetings and parents' meetings are held regularly. Student projects are conducted under the guidance of teachers and are evaluated both internally and externally. In the month of June, the Principal convenes a staff meeting and drafts a comprehensive action plan in consultation with all staff members.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

The institution is very particular about organizing classroom transactions in tune with the recent developments in the field of teaching methodology and pedagogy. Experimental learning, participatory learning, and problem-solving methodologies have been, thus, consistently followed by faculty members in accordance with the discipline they handle. Council meetings are often held to discuss innovative ways by whichthe classrooms could be madestudentcentric. Active participation of students in learning activities is always ensured by conducting seminars, group discussions, and debates. Students themselves are entrusted with the task of conducting such activities so as to instill organizational spirit in them. Students are tasked with projects and assignments periodically to enhance their problem-solving potential. Field visits and industry visits are regularly conducted to make learning more experiential. Many departments provide opportunities to their students for experiential learning by including fieldwork and internship programs. As part of the social outreach program, thestudents visited nearby tribal colonies to impart a basic understanding of English communication. No opportunity is missed in involving the students in theorganization of webinars and other activities,

2.3.2 - Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process. Write description in maximum of 200 words

Teachers use ICT-enabled tools to make the teaching-learning process effective. We had twenty Smart rooms to meet the growing demand for internet-enabled, visually oriented classroom experiences. Due to the outbreak of the pandemic, teaching-learning activities have been shifted to online mode. Most of the teachers turned to work from home and handled classes using various Learning Management Systems. As a result of the prolonged lockdown, e-gadgets arranged in the smart classrooms have been kept out of use for months. This resulted in damage to most of the gadgets. During the lockdown, some teachers engaged classes directly from smart rooms available in the college to simulate the classroom atmosphere. We have a 100mbh internet connection in college to ensureeffective online classroom transactions. As a special drive to enhancethe possibility of digital learning we have submitted a detailed proposal to RUSA to make more classrooms smart. It is learned that the said proposal is accepted positively by the authority concerned. Our proposals for a fully functional language lab and media lab are under active consideration. It is only a matter of a few months before we could organize a digital ecology in our college to provide an effective teaching-learning experience to students.

2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

The College is affiliated with the University of Calicut and hence the directions given by the University are to be strictly followed. Choice Based Credit Semester System was introduced by the University of Calicut at the UG and PG levels. In2013, University introduced a system for both Continuous Evaluation and End Semester Evaluation. In tune with the reforms made by the University, the internal evaluation system of the College is also revised from time to time. Proper directions on both Continuous Assessment and End Semester Evaluation (ESE) are communicated to the students by way of the prospectus, departmental meetings, and interactions. During the orientation program, the students are given a clear idea about the CBCSS, syllabus, and evaluation. The entire internal evaluation process is continuous that involves internal tests, group discussions, assignments, seminars, and projects. Internal Monitoring Cell, constituted both at the college level and department level, monitors the implementation and frequency of continuous assessment methods. In the context of COVID 19, internal examinations have been carried out on online platforms. After the conduct of internal examinations, the answer scripts are evaluated within the stipulated time. Remedial coaching is provided to slow learners.

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

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The College has an effective three-tier grievance system, starting with the individual teacher, then the department level, and at the College level. This system addresses the grievances of the students, pertaining to the marks obtained in the internal examination. Mark sheets are prepared with utmost care and are published on the notice board. Grievances and complaints raised are addressed by faculty. Teachers are advised to maintain a portfolio regarding the activities conducted as part of the internal assessment so as to produce the same before the grievance cell in case of any complaint. Redressal of grievances is made at the department level when any grievances are raised. The IT facilities available at the college are on pace with the latest technologies. Smart interactive displays are now replacing the existing smart classrooms with projectors and smartboards. The general computer lab existing on the campus is now upgraded to stateof-the-art infrastructure with latest machines. It is also renamed as Common IT Facilitation Centre (CITFC) and can accommodate 24 students. The latest computing devices ensure a 24 X 7 browsing experience with a speed of 100 Mbps. CITFC conducts softwareoriented workshops with premium hands-on expertise for the incumbents. The college has two internet leased lines. One of the leased lines is provided by BSNL under the NMEICT scheme of MHRD, Govt. of India. The connection is established via tower to tower radio link. The bandwidth of the NMEICT connection is 10 Mbps. The other leased line is provided by Malanad broadband services, which currently offers a bandwidth of 100 Mbps. The connection runs on a wired optical fiber line that can be expanded up to 500 Mbps upon demand. The entire internet backbone of the college currently runs on an average bandwidth of 100 Mbps. Limited Campus-wide WIFI is available for the beneficiaries with speeds up to 40 Mbps.

NMSM Govt College Kalpetta has been keen on keeping the campus clean and green by managing degradable and non-degradable wastes. As the institution is located around three kilometers away from the State Highway and there are no eateries nearby, 879students coming from different parts of the district and even from outside the district either bring their lunch or depend on the canteen available on the campus. Earlier, due to the lack of an adequate waste management system, the campus had become littered with food wastes. As the first step towards managing waste effectively, Kalpetta Municipality was approached forsupport. Municipal authority assured their support and arranged for two of their staff to pick garbage from the campus every two weeks. An awareness program was conducted under the aegis of the NSS unit among students as to how to manage food waste. Waste bins have beenset up at a few places for the students and staff. Food wastes thus collected have been offered to the nearby pig farmers. WIth the support of the PTA and all faculty members we have constituted a body to extend material support to the needy to pursue online education. Many students have benefited by this initiative. 3. Ecothoughts: An initiative by the P G

Department of Economics to promote research and discussions on everyday economics. It conducts seminars and workshops in the merging fields in Economics. Already conducted 6 webinars wherein scholars from across India and outside have participated. II. TRIBAL EMPOWERMENT 1. Planting the Seeds of Words: In association with the Department of Languages an activity oriented programme entitled Planting the Seeds of Wordshas been conductedfor the children of Chembothara tribal cololny to improve their communicative competence. Senior UG students from our college came forward to act as resource persons. Considering the enthusiasm of the learners we have decided to arrange more sessions as per the convinience of the resource group. 2. Shedding the Light of Words A small reading corner has been set up for the children of Padapuram colony to motivate them to read. NSS unit extended all support to actualise this project 3. Nattarangu: In collaboration with the BRC Kalpetta, we organised a 5 day's creative camp for the tribal students of the nearby village. They performed various cultural, activities. They were given expert sessions on various topics. Last day of the camp their products were exhibited for the public. 35 students have participated. 4. Know Your Rights To make the women aware of their rights and possibilities, with the support of the ST Department, a saession has been conducted to the tribal women of Padapuram colony. The resource person from the ST Department spoke about the government policies vis a vis the development of the tribal community.

7.3 - Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 - Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 200 words

This year we give top priority to Social Outreach Programmes to disseminate the power of words across society. Being the only government college under the jurisdiction of Calicut University in the predominantly tribal district of Wayanad, NMSM Govt College realises its responsibility to reach out to the outside communinty to extend its support to the needy. The college chalks out various programmes to demonstrate its commitment to the marginalized sections of the society by providing ample support in learning activities. IQAC, in association with the Block Resource Group, Kalpetta, conducted a 5-day workshop entitled Nattarangu, for the children of Padapuram Colony. The handicraft products made by the participants were exhibited on the fifth day. Resource persons from various spheres engaged sessions to enlighten the participants. With the active support of the NSS unit, a reading corner has been set up at the Padapuram tribal colony under the title Words and Worlds to initiate children to the world of reading. Each member of the NSS unit collected 10 books to raise the total collection to 1000 books.

NMSM Government College, Kalpetta is located in Wayanad, the district with the largest tribal population in Kerala. Efforts toward curriculum enrichment and effective curriculum delivery have always been a priority of the institution. The library has been automated by installing KOHA software. Academic seminars and workshops are regularly conducted with the assistance of the UGC/ State Government and duly supported by IQAC. Owing to the pandemic situation, classroom transactions have been shifted to online platforms. Each teacher is instructed to submit a daily report of their classroom activities through a google form. Through Online Education Support Centre, a joint venture of alumni, staff, and PTA to provide e-gadgets to economically weak students, smartphones were issued to those who weredeserving. Feedback is collected from students and analyzed properly; effective remedial actions are taken without delay. Every year in the month of June, the Principal convenes a staff meeting and drafts a comprehensive action plan in consultation with all staff members. Timely interventions of the IQAC in matters regarding academic activities and co-curricular activities enhance the quality of the teaching-learning process.

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journals and periodicals. The library has been automated by installing KOHA software. Academic seminars and workshops are regularly conducted. However, the prolonged lockdown consequent of the pandemic, forced the institution to curtail many such activities indefinitely. The college calendar is in tune with the one provided by University and the same is executed through the master timetable and departmental timetables. Continuous evaluation is regularly monitored. Feedback is collected from students, parents, teachers, alumni etc. and analyzed systematically. The institution is very particular about organizing classroom transactions in tune with the recent developments in the field of teaching methodology and pedagogy. Experimental learning,

Teachers use ICT-enabled tools to make the teaching-learning process effective. We had twenty Smart rooms to meet the growing demand for internet-enabled, visually oriented classroom experiences. Due to the outbreak of the pandemic, teachinglearning activities have been shifted to online mode. Most of the teachers turned to work from home and handled classes using various Learning Management Systems. As a result of the prolonged lockdown, e-gadgets arranged in the smart classrooms have been kept out of use for months. This resulted in damage to most of the gadgets. During the lockdown, some teachers engaged classes directly from smart rooms available in the college to simulate the classroom atmosphere. We have a 100mbh internet connection in college to ensureeffective online classroom transactions. As a special drive to enhancethe possibility of digital learning we have submitted a detailed proposal to RUSA to make more classrooms smart. It is learned that the said proposal is accepted positively by the authority concerned. Our proposals for

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a fully functional language lab and media lab are under active consideration. It is only a matter of a few months before we could organize a digital ecology in our college to provide an effective teaching-learning experience to students.

The College is affiliated with the University of Calicut and hence the directions given by the University are to be strictly followed. Choice Based Credit Semester System was introduced by the University of Calicut at the UG and PG levels. In2013, University introduced a system for both Continuous Evaluation and End Semester Evaluation. In tune with the reforms made by the University, the internal evaluation system of the College is also revised from time to time. Proper directions on both Continuous Assessment and End Semester Evaluation (ESE) are communicated to the students by way of the prospectus, departmental meetings, and interactions. During the orientation program, the students are given a clear idea about the CBCSS, syllabus, and evaluation. The

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entire internal evaluation process is continuous that involves internal tests, group discussions, assignments, seminars, and projects. Internal Monitoring Cell, constituted both at the college level and department level, monitors the implementation and frequency of continuous assessment methods. In the context of COVID 19, internal examinations have been carried out on online platforms. After the conduct of internal examinations, the answer scripts are evaluated within the stipulated time. Remedial coaching is provided to slow learners.

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

The College has an effective three-tier grievance system, starting with the individual teacher, then the department level, and at the College level. This system addresses the grievances of the students, pertaining to the marks obtained in the internal examination. Mark sheets are prepared with utmost care and are published on the notice board. Grievances and complaints raised are addressed by faculty. Teachers are advised to maintain a portfolio regarding the activities conducted as part of the internal assessment so as to produce the same before the grievance cell in case of any complaint. Redressal of grievances is made at the department level when any grievances are raised. After the stipulated period, mark lists are finalized and uploaded to the University website and the hard copy signed by the students is forwarded to College Office and then to the University with the approval of the Principal. The introduction of the new system of evaluation has brought about visible changes in the performance of the students, both curricular and extracurricular activities. Only on rare occasions, the collegelevel grievance cell chaired by the Principal is required to intervene. During the last academic year, no such grievances were reported on the part of students.

The IT facilities available at the college are on pace with the latest technologies. Smart interactive displays are now replacing the existing smart classrooms with projectors and smartboards. The general computer lab existing on the campus is now upgraded to state-of-the-art infrastructure with latest machines. It is also renamed as Common IT Facilitation Centre (CITFC) and can accommodate 24 students. The latest computing devices ensure a 24 X 7 browsing experience with a speed of 100 Mbps. CITFC conducts software-oriented workshops with premium hands-on expertise for the incumbents. The college has two internet leased lines. One of the leased lines is provided by BSNL under the NMEICT scheme of MHRD, Govt. of India. The connection is established via tower to tower radio link. The bandwidth of the NMEICT connection is 10 Mbps. The other leased line is provided by Malanad broadband

services, which currently offers a bandwidth of 100 Mbps. The connection runs on a wired optical fiber line that can be expanded up to 500 Mbps upon demand. The entire internet backbone of the college currently runs on an average bandwidth of 100 Mbps. Limited Campus-wide WIFI is available for the beneficiaries with speeds up to 40 Mbps.

NMSM Govt College Kalpetta has been keen on keeping the campus clean and green by managing degradable and non-degradable wastes. As the institution is located around three kilometers away from the State Highway and there are no eateries nearby, 879students coming from different parts of the district and even from outside the district either bring their lunch or depend on the canteen available on the campus. Earlier, due to the lack of an adequate waste management system, the campus had become littered with food wastes. As the first step towards managing waste effectively, Kalpetta Municipality was approached forsupport. Municipal authority assured their support and arranged for two of their

staff to pick garbage from the campus every two weeks. An awareness program was conducted under the aegis of the NSS unit among students as to how to manage food waste. Waste bins have beenset up at a few places for the students and staff. Food wastes thus collected have been offered to the nearby pig farmers. Non-degradable waste materials are removed by the Municipal officials. A proposal has been submitted for the installation of solar panels and we expect a positive response from the Kerala State Electricity Board soon.

- 6. Imparting IT literacy to the tribal and rural areas focusing on data security, privacy, and usage issues.
- 7. Planning to organize short-term courses and national workshops in innovative areas.
- 8. College plans to establish audio-visual room for all departments.
- 9. Post Graduate departments of the college are planning to develop E-contents/ Massive Open Online Courses in collaboration with EMMRC, University of Calicut.
