A Brief History

Crowning a hillock in majestic splendour and set against a lush verdant backdrop, NMSM Government College is the pride of Kalpetta. N.M.S.M Govt. College, Kalpetta, was established in October 1981 in Jinachandra Memorial Auditorium, Kalpetta. In the year 1983, the College moved to its permanent campus enclosed by a green and cool landscape at Vellaramkunnu 4 Kilometers from Kalpetta through Mysore-Calicut Highway (NH 766). The entire landscape spanning around 25 acres has been donated by late Sri. Neelikandy Moideen Sahib to the college sponsoring committee. The college has been named after him as Neelikandy Moideen Sahib Memorial Govt. College. The institute was upgraded to the status of a degree college in 1989 with the commencement of B.A in History. Subsequently, B.Com (1990), B.A Development Economics and B.A Mass Communication (1999), BSc. Computer Science (2012), and BSc. Chemistry (2021) were introduced. The college ventured into postgraduate studies with M.Com (1993), followed by M.A in Economics and Journalism and Mass Communication (2016), and later, M.A History with an elective in World History (2020). In 2016, the college was re-accredited with B+ by National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC). N.M.S.M Govt. College is approved by the UGC for assistance under 2(f) and 12(b) of UGC Act 1956. The college celebrated its silver jubilee in 2007.

At present, there are **37** permanent teaching staff, **10** contract teachers, and **21** non-teaching staff members in the college who work in unison for overall academic and co-curricular achievements of the student community. More than 75 percent of the students belong to socially and economically weaker sections of the society. About 72 percent of the student population are girls. The College is committed to serving the economically and socially marginalized sections of the society and provides university education in a calm atmosphere, especially for students who belong to Wayanad and its nearby districts. In keeping with its mission, the College promotes inclusive practices in the implementation of its academic programs, taking into account learning differences and special needs of students. The College has a general library, media lab, language lab and departmental libraries and computer labs. Students are also provided with numerous facilities like seminar hall, auditorium, ORICE, digital theatre, gymnasium, canteen, ladies waiting room and ladies hostel. There are two N.S.S units and one N.C.C unit functioning in this College.

PROGRAMME STRUCTURE

Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP)

Our institution adheres to the Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP) from the academic year 2024-2025, as implemented by the University of Calicut, in alignment with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. The programme aims to provide multidisciplinary education and skill development through flexible exit options. The FYUGP provides a flexible framework with multiple exit and re-entry points, enabling students to earn a Certificate, Diploma, or Degree at various stages of progression. By completing the fourth year, students can attain a Bachelor's Degree with Honours or Research, which includes an intensive research project or dissertation. This forward-looking programme ensures holistic development and prepares graduates to meet global academic and professional standards.

Duration: 4 years, divided into 8 semesters.

Credit-based Structure: Completion of 133 credits for a three-year degree and 177 credits for the honours degree.

Exit Options:

Certificate after 1 year (2 semesters).

Diploma after 2 years (4 semesters).

Bachelor's Degree after 3 years (6 semesters).

Bachelor's Degree with Honours/Research after 4 years (8 semesters).

Academic Pathways: Single Major, Major with Minor, Vocational Minor, Major with Multiple Disciplines, or Double Major.

SEMESTER-WISE STRUCTURE

The Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP) at Calicut University is structured into eight semesters, offering a balanced mix of foundation courses, discipline-specific courses, skill enhancement, and research opportunities.

Students who complete an additional 44 credits during this year receive a **Bachelor's Degree with Honours or Honours with Research.**

CHOICE BASED CREDIT AND SEMESTER SYSTEM (CUCBCSS)

A choice based credit semester system and grading have been introduced for the UG curriculum in affiliated colleges of the university with effect from 2009 admissions. The regulations for choice based credit and semester system for under graduate curriculum-**2019 (CBCSS UG Regulations 2019)** for all UG programmes under CBCSS regular in the University of Calicut, with **effect from 2019 admission** has been implemented for ensuring quality and learner-centeredness.

The regulations shall apply to all UG programmes under the University of Calicut for the **admissions commencing from 2019, with effect from the academic year 2019-2020.** The curriculum restructuring envisages a thorough revamp of the existing one in concept, structure, content, spirit and methodology. Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS) imminently fits into the emerging socioeconomic milieu, and could effectively respond to the educational and occupational aspirations of the upcoming generations.

The duration of a **UG programme shall be 6 semesters** distributed over a period of **3 academic years.** The UG programme shall include five types of courses, viz; **Common Courses** (Code A), **Core courses** (Code B), **Complementary courses** (Code C), **Open Course** (Code D) and **Audit courses** (Code E). In general, every UG student shall undergo **10 common courses (total 38 credits)** chosen from a group of 14 common courses for completing the programme. Core courses are the courses in the major (core) subject of the degree programme chosen by

the student. Complementary courses cover one or two disciplines that are related to the core subject and are distributed in the first four semesters.

There shall be one **open course in core subjects in the fifth semester**. The open course shall be open to all the students in the institution except the students in the parent department. The students can opt that course from any other department in the institution. **Ability Enhancement courses/Audit courses are courses which are mandatory for a programme but not counted for the calculation of SGPA or CGPA**. There shall be one Audit course each in the first four semesters. These courses are not meant for class room study. The students can attain only pass (Grade P) for these courses. At the end of each semester there shall be examination conducted by the college from a pool of questions (Question Bank) set by the University. Extra credits are mandatory for the programme.

Extra credits will be awarded to students who participate in activities like **NCC, NSS and Swatch Bharath**. Those students who could not join in any of the above activities have to undergo Calicut University Social Service Programme (CUSSP). Extra credits are not counted for SGPA or CGPA. A student is required to acquire a minimum of **140 credits** for the completion of the **UG programme**, of which **120 credits** are to be acquired from class room study and shall only be counted for SGPA and CGPA. Out of the 120 credits, 38 (22 for common (English) courses + 16 for common languages other than English) credits shall be from common courses, 2 credits for project/corresponding paper and 3 credits for the open course. The maximum credits for a course shall not exceed 5.

Audit courses shall have 4 credits per course and a total of 16 credits in the entire programme. The maximum credit acquired under extra credit shall be 4. If more Extra credit activities are done by a student that may be mentioned in the Grade card. The credits of audited courses or extra credits are not counted for SGPA or CGPA.

Every student of a **UG degree programme** shall have to work on a **project of 2 credits** under the supervision of a faculty member or shall write a theory course based on Research Methodology as per the curriculum. A student shall be permitted to appear for the semester examination, only if he/she secures **not less than 75% attendance** in each semester

A semester is a sequence of 18 academic weeks of five working days each. It will have a minimum of 90 working days including examinations. The measure of the weekly unit of work assigned for the course is known as the credit of the course.

It is the index of the total number of teaching hours attended by the student. Usually, **18 hours of classroom teaching activity would make the student gain a credit.** Extra credit is the additional credits acquired by the student for co-curricular activities.

CHOICE-BASED CREDIT SEMESTER SYSTEM-PG (CBCSS PG – 2019)

DURATION OF THE PROGRAMME: The minimum duration for completion of a four-semester **PG Programme is two years.** The maximum period for completion is 4 years

PROGRAMME STRUCTURE: The programme shall include three types of courses: Core courses, Elective courses and Audit Courses. Comprehensive Viva-voce and Project Work /Dissertation shall be treated as Core Courses. Project Work is mandatory for all regular programmes and Comprehensive Viva-voce is optional and these shall be done in the end semester. Total credit for the programme shall be 80 (eighty) Total Credit for Core Courses shall not be less than 60 (sixty). Total Credit for Elective Courses shall not be less than 12 (twelve) and not more than 20.

Study Tour / Field visit / Industrial visit / Trip for specimen collection may be conducted as a part of the Programme as per the stipulations of the BoS concerned.

Audit Courses: In addition to the above courses there will be two Audit Courses (Ability Enhancement Course & Professional Competency Course) with 4 credits each. These have to be done one each in the first two semesters. Audit courses are mandatory for pass and completion of Programme. The credits will not be counted for evaluating the overall SGPA & CGPA.

The students admitted in the PG programmes in affiliated colleges shall be required to attend **at least 75 percent of the total number of** classes (theory/practical) held during each semester. There shall be University examination at the end of each semester. There shall be one end-semester examination of 3 hours duration for each theory course and the duration of practical course can be decided by the concerned BoS.

FACILITIES

- Library

The college library serves as a vital hub of information for the academic community, offering a general library and sectional libraries for various subjects and languages. Open to students and teaching staff on all working days from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., it is equipped with advanced RFID technology for efficient

inventory management, anti-theft security, and self-service check-in and checkout. The library houses 24,816 books, barcoded resources, and subscriptions to newspapers and periodicals in English and Malayalam. Modern facilities include a user-friendly OPAC, high-speed internet, Xerox services, CCTV surveillance, a backup inverter system, smart TVs, and printers. By integrating traditional resources with advanced technology, it ensures a seamless and enriching experience for its users.

- Edusat/ORICE Studio

An Edusat enabled air conditioned mini conference hall functions in the college. The transmission using Edusat is operated by the Edusat studio of Collegiate Education Thiruvananthapuram upon demand. The conference hall now mainly serves the purpose of ORICE Classes in both Video Conference and live streaming mode. The hall is well equipped with 10 mpbs leased internet line and can accommodate 60 persons. 24x7 power backup is ensured in the hall while conducting various programs. The best in class sound system and projection methods are suitable for effective multimedia presentations. The video conference system available in the hall is utilized by different academic and administrative bodies of government to address faculties, students and administrative mechanisms from various colleges in Wayanad.

- Common IT Facilitation Centre

The Common IT Facilitation Centre (CITFC) at the college is a fully equipped, modern IT hub designed to meet the academic and technological needs of students, faculty, and staff. The facility includes 24 computer nodes, a high-speed 300 Mbps leased internet connection, and is air-conditioned for comfort. The centre is also set up for face-to-face software training sessions, providing a conducive environment for learning and development.

- Language Lab

The college's Language Lab is an air-conditioned facility equipped with 16 student laptops and one instructor laptop, providing a comfortable environment for language learning. Open to all students, the lab supports interactive lessons, enhancing language proficiency through modern tools and software. It promotes personalized learning and fosters communication skills in a focused setting.

- Digital Theater

A digital theatre which can accommodate 60 students at a time is one of our prestigious achievements. Our students get vivid audio/visual experiences here. Ms. Sheeja K.S., Assistant Professor, Department of Mass Communication, is in charge of the theatre.

- Seminar hall

The college maintains an excellent Seminar Hall named “Vaikhari”. Almost all the programmes of our college are conducted here. Around **140** persons can be accommodated here at a time. Since it is equipped with UPS, programmes can be conducted here even if there is failure of electricity.

- Auditorium

NMSM Government College can proudly claim "Sarangi" as the best auditorium in our district, with a seating capacity of around 800 people. The soundproof auditorium, named Sarangi, adds an extra touch of vibrancy to the events held here.

- Co-operative Society

A cooperative society, with both students and teachers as members, operates in the college. The store, managed by the society, offers college books, textbooks, and stationery at concessional rates. It also provides photocopying services for students and staff.

- Ladies Waiting Room

The Women Development Cell of the College provides for its girl students a waiting room for making their free time creative and leisurely.

- Hostel

A women’s hostel named “ Kabani” provides accommodation facilities for the students from other districts and faraway places. Around 50 students make use of the hostel facilities provided by the college.

- Gymnasium

The College maintains an eight station Gymnasium. It is open to students and staff in the evening hours. The gymnasium is equipped with all modern machinery for exercise and body building.

- Canteen

The college operates a canteen that remains open during regular working hours. It serves breakfast, lunch, and snacks at subsidized rates. As part of the initiative to achieve a hunger-free campus, the canteen offers food for just ₹10, ensuring affordability and accessibility for all students.

NATIONAL CADET CORPS (NCC)

The NCC (National Cadet Corps) Army Wing at our college functions under the 5 Kerala Battalion and offers 160 students the opportunity to join. Membership in NCC is voluntary and selective, with a commitment of three years. In the second year, students can appear for the 'B' Certificate exam, and in the third year, for the 'C' Certificate exam. NCC cadets receive grace marks and have opportunities for placement in uniformed services like the police, army, excise, fire force, and forest departments. The Kerala Government provides preference in these selections for cadets with 'B' and 'C' certificates. Additionally, 15% of seats are reserved for 'C' certificate holders with 'B' grading in Army Commissioned Officer's selection. NCC training instils discipline, teamwork, and a spirit of selfless service, preparing cadets for a career in national defense and public service.

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (NSS)

The National Service Scheme (NSS) at our college operates two units, with a capacity of 100 students. Membership is voluntary and selective. Applications for enrolment are invited by the programme officers at the start of each academic year. Over a period of two years, volunteers must complete 240 hours of community service and attend a 7-day special camp. NSS membership, along with a university-issued certificate, is considered an additional qualification for public service recruitments. Volunteers with 75% attendance in regular activities and who attend the special camp are eligible for grace grade points. Additional grace points are also granted to those participating in youth festivals or national camps.

TUTORIAL

The students of small groups will be put under a tutor. The tutor will help the students in both curricular and extracurricular activities. They shall meet their ward at least once in a week. All requests addressed to the Principal shall be forwarded only through the respective tutors. They shall also call the parents of their respective wards as and when necessary. The tutor can avail the service of the head of the department for the effective implementation of the scheme. They have to submit reports of their work of each term, to the department head and the department heads will submit a consolidated report of each programme to the principal in each term.

CAREER GUIDANCE AND PLACEMENT CELL

The Career Guidance and Placement cell functioning in the college helps the students develop their careers through various programmes. Add-on courses, NET coaching, career guidance seminars etc. are undertaken by the cell.

WOMEN'S CELL

Women's Cell functioning in the college aims at the intellectual and social upliftment of the girl students in the college, under the able guidance of a team of lady teachers. It conducts classes in Tailoring, Karate, Home Management etc.

COUNSELLING CENTRE (JEEVANI)

The Jeevani Counselling Centre at our college is committed to supporting students in managing stress and enhancing their emotional well-being, helping them succeed in higher education. At the beginning of each academic year, the college appoints a M.Sc. Psychology graduate to provide professional counselling services. The centre offers students a supportive space to discuss personal, academic, or emotional challenges, helping them build resilience and achieve their academic goals.

TOURISM CLUB

A Tourism Club has functions in the college with the assistance of the department of Tourism, Govt. of Kerala. The main objectives of the club are to create awareness about the socio-economic relevance of tourism for the development of the state and to create a rational approach towards tourism, environment and nature among the students. Membership in the club is for three years and is limited only to 50 students.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP DEVELOPMENT CLUB (EDC)

In association with the Industries Department, Govt. of Kerala, an Entrepreneurship Development Club (EDC) functions in the college. The main objective of the club is to change the mind-set of students and to develop an industrial culture among the students community. The club conducts programmes such as interaction with successful entrepreneurs, visits to industrial units within and outside states and entrepreneurship development programmes. Now the club has started giving training to selected members in the manufacturing of various

consumable products. The club also intends to provide individual development programmes and entrepreneurship development programmes to its members. A total number of 50 students from different disciplines are enrolled as members.

THE COLLEGE UNION

1.General College Rules

- Be clean and decorous in dress, language and behaviour. All students should observe strict modesty in dress and manners.
- Perfect discipline and decorum should be maintained in the classrooms and the college campus.
- Students shall always keep the identity cards with them and produce on demand by the college authorities.
- Smoking and use of intoxicants are strictly prohibited.
- The students are strictly prohibited from the use of mobile phones in the campus. Any violation in this respect will be strictly dealt with by fine or further actions.
- Do not participate in any movement likely to promote communal ill feeling.
- Do not disfigure college walls, desk or benches with writing or engravings of any description, what so ever and do not tamper with or damage fittings, articles, furniture or library books. Further, students will not be allowed to put the board of political organizations within the campus. Such posts and boards must only be put outside the campus.
- Students shall not loiter through the corridors or along the verandahs during class hours.

- No meeting or entertainment shall be organised or any fund collected in the college without the prior permission of the principal.
- Students should take note of the notifications put on the notice board every day before they leave the college. Failure to look at the notice board will not be an excuse for any omission or commission.
- In regard to all matters of conduct in and outside the college not specially mentioned herein, students are expected to conduct themselves in such a way as to maintain the fair name of the college as well as their own.
- The principal shall have the power to exercise his discretionary power in matters of punishments; fine, cancellation of attendance, forfeiture of educational concession and scholarships, suspension, compulsory issue of T.C. etc.
- Promotion to higher class, selection for university examination and issue of progress attendance or conduct certificate etc are absolutely the discretion of the principal
- As per government orders, ragging in any form should be sternly and effectively prevented. Whenever a criminal offence is committed in the name of ragging whether within the campus or outside the principal will report the matter forthwith to the nearest police station and not wait till a complaint is received in this regard. Appropriate disciplinary action will also be taken against the culprits.
- Students will not be allowed to organize any political demonstrations, meetings or committees during the class hours. Such programmes must only be organized during the lunch time or after the academic hours.
- The students are requested to abstain from those strikes with canceling the classes. It will be admissible, if such strikes are reduced to demonstrations with the prior permission of the principal.
- The students must ensure that, no outsiders including the leaders of the organizations come in to the campus except in exceptional circumstances. If such visits are necessary, special care must be taken to inform the matter to the head of the institution in advance so as to prevent any form of disharmony among the students.
- The student organizations before conducting any class campaigns in emergency situations must definitely seek the prior permission of the Principal.

- Those students who are late by 5 minutes in the class without sufficient reasons must be denied their attendance during that particular hour. As each hour is counted for the half day attendance, students must be punctual in the class.

2. Library Rules

1. The books will be issued to students from the Central Library as per the schedule arranged by the Librarian.

2. Number of books a student can borrow at a time from the library:

Degree -2 .This number can be revised as per the advice of the Library Advisory Committee after considering total number of books available in the library and the total number of students in the College.Post Graduate- 4 (Same as above)

3. Books borrowed from the Central Library must be returned within a fortnight and they can be renewed for a further period of seven days if no one else has applied for the same book.

4. (a) Absence from college will not be accepted as an excuse for not returning the books in time.

(b) If the due date for return of books falls on weekends or holidays the book must be returned on the next working day.

(c) Books borrowed for use during Onam, Christmas and summer vacations should be returned not later than the third day after the reopening of the college.

(d) Annual Stock Verification- All the books borrowed from the Central Library by students and members of teaching and non-teaching staff must be returned by the first of March every year for the annual physical stock verification of the library.

5. (a) Failure to return a book on or before the due date entails the student to pay a fine of one rupee per day of delay for each book.

(b) Failure to pay fine in time will result in the forfeiture of the right to borrow books till fines are paid.

(c) Transfer Certificates will be issued and caution deposit refunded only after clearing all the dues to the library.

6. (a) A member of the teaching staff is allowed to borrow ten books at a time from the Central Library.

(b) Members of the non-teaching staff are allowed to borrow three books at a time from the Central Library.

7. (a) All books should be returned in time for the annual physical stock verification in March every year.

(b) A member of staff who takes leave must return all the books borrowed from the library before proceeding on leave.

8. Disfiguring the pages, scribbling on pages, tearing pages, damaging and injuring of binding will be held as serious damage to books and in such cases they are either to be replaced by new copies or get bound by the borrowers as the case may be.

9. For loss of books the following procedure will be followed:- as per **G.O.1028/A3/93.H.Edn. dated 28/05/1993.**

(i) If new edition or copies of the lost books are available with the book suppliers, the book has to be replaced by a new one.

(ii) If the lost book is not available for replacement the value of the lost book will be realized at the following rates:-

(a) Ten times the face value of the books which are published prior to 1946.

(b) Six times face value of the books which are published, prior to 1970.

(c) Three times the face value of the books in all other cases.

(d) If the book value cannot be ascertained from the Library Stock Registers compensation will be fixed on the basis of the market price of similar publication at the time of fixation.

10. Sub-lending and transferring of books to other persons' are not allowed.

11. Books from the reference section shall not be taken outside the library.

12. Strict silence should be observed in the Library. Personal belongings such as umbrellas, bags, tiffin carriers, etc., are not allowed to be kept in the Library. Smoking, sleeping and indecorous behaviour are prohibited inside the Library. The use of mobile phones is strictly prohibited inside the library.

13. In all matters regarding the Library the decision of the Principal shall be final.

3. Anti Ragging Rules

Kerala Ragging Prohibition Act 1998

For the information of the students and their parents, extracts from the Kerala Ragging Prohibition Act published in 1998, forbidding ragging in the educational institutions of Kerala are quoted below:

1. By Ragging, it is meant any physical or mental torture or any disorderly conduct towards any student of an educational institution causing apprehension, dread, and agitation in him/her. It can be any harassment like insulting, teasing, bullying or manhandling. It can also be forcing upon him/her to do something which he/she voluntarily wouldn't dare to do normally.
2. Prohibition of Ragging: Ragging is prohibited both inside and outside an educational the campus.
3. Punishment for Ragging: Any student involved in ragging/persuades other for ragging or advocated ragging/ either inside or outside an educational institution shall be subject to a punishment of not more than two years imprisonment in addition to a penalty of not over Rs. 10,000.00.
4. Dismissal of Students: A student subject to the punishment under section (4) is liable to be dismissed from the institution and will be barred from being admitted to any other institution for a period of three years from the date of receipt of his/her dismissal order.
5. Suspension of students: If a student/parent/guardian or any teacher of the institution forwards a written complaint to the Head of the institution, he/she has to make an urgent enquiry into the matter within 7 days of receipt of such a complaint. If the allegation is proved to be correct, the accused must be suspended with immediate effect and the matter be referred to the police for further proceedings. 2(1) As is said in sub-section I, if a written complaint is received by the head of the institution, he has to make a detailed enquiry and if it is found baseless, the complainant must be informed of it in writing.
6. Abetting: If the head of the institution refuses to take action in the manner described under section 6 or is negligent in initiating any steps, he is to be treated as one abetting the crime and is liable to be punished.

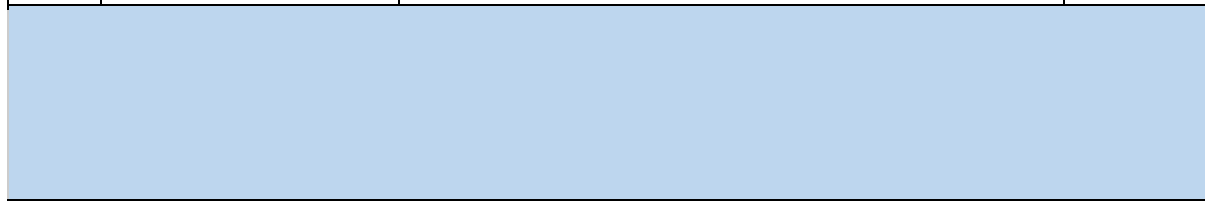
